

JAMES K. GLASSMAN

James K. Glassman is a resident fellow at the American Enterprise Institute, a Washington public policy think tank, where he specializes in issues involving economics, technology and financial markets. He is also host of TechCentralStation.com, a public affairs website that concentrates on matters of technology and public policy.

Glassman is author of *The Secret Code of the Superior Investor* (Crown), which *Business Week* called the best financial book of the 2002 season. Since 1993, he has written a weekly syndicated investing column for the *Washington Post*. It appears in many newspapers, including the *New York Daily News* and the *International Herald Tribune*. In the past, Glassman was a columnist for *The Reader's Digest*, *USNews & World Report* and others.

He has also had extensive television experience – as host of *Capital Gang Sunday* on CNN and *TechnoPolitics* on PBS. He has been a guest on ABC's *Good Morning America* and *Nightline*, CNN's *Larry King Show*, PBS's *Charlie Rose Show*, and others. His articles have appeared in *The Wall Street Journal*, *Forbes*, *The New York Times*, *The Los Angeles Times*, and others.

From 1987 to 1993, he was editor and part owner of *Roll Call*, the twice-weekly newspaper that covers Congress. Prior to that, he had a long career in magazine publishing – including posts as president of *The Atlantic Monthly* and publisher of *The New Republic*.

He is co-author, with the economist Kevin Hassett, of *Dow 36,000*, the controversial best-selling book on stock valuation. *Newsweek*'s Allan Sloan said the book “has wonderfully clear explanations of financial theory and excellent advice on general investing approaches.”

Glassman has given frequent congressional testimony, recently on subjects as varied as telecommunications policy, corporate accounting scandals, Securities and Exchange Commission regulations, Social Security reform and personal investing. He has also been invited to deliver distinguished lectures. In April 2002, for example, he delivered the annual Mansfield-American Pacific Lecture on corporate governance in Tokyo and in September was lead-off speaker at the London meeting of the Mont Pelerin Society, a global organization of international economists founded in 1947.

In May 2002, he was named by President Bush to the President's Council on the 21st Century Workforce and is the recipient of, among other honors, the Norman B. Ture Award of the Tax Foundation for contribution toward sound tax policy and the Warren Brookes Award of the American Legislative Exchange Council for distinguished journalism.

He is a graduate of Harvard University, where he was managing editor of the university daily, *The Crimson*.
