

New Year Resolutions

As a new year begins, it is traditional to make a new year's resolution. We, at AGA, have been busy making ours. As your elected officers and directors, our resolution is to continue to sponsor dynamic and informative program activities for our Chapter members.

The program that we are planning for the remainder of this year is multifaceted. It includes educational events, employment referrals, and membership drives. This month, I would like to focus on two of these facets: educational events and luncheon meetings.

Our Education Directors, Bill Henderson and Sue Fields have prepared an outstanding educational program for the next six months.

- On January 15, Roger Charin, Arthur Young and Company, will update us on individual tax return preparation. As you may remember, Roger gave an excellent presentation last year to a sold out crowd. Look for additional information and registration procedures on page 3 of this month's newsletter.
- On January 29, the Capital Region will sponsor the Professional Development Seminar.

- In March, we are scheduling a session on the Federal Managers Financial Integrity Act implementation. Key federal managers will highlight changes made to agency programs over the last five years.

• On June 20-22, the Association will sponsor the Professional Development Conference in Washington DC. This year, the theme of the PDC is "Committed to Professional Excellence at all Levels of Government". The agenda is shaping up with exceptional speakers. Mark your calendar early for this event.

Our Program Director, John Simonette, continues to emphasize excellence in his management of our Chapter's luncheon program. Meredith Williams is the Kansas Legislative Post Auditor, heading up the Kansas Legislative Division of Post Audit. The Division serves as the audit arm of Kansas government, reporting to the Legislative Post Audit Committee, a 10-member joint committee of the Kansas Legislature. Meredith joined the Division's staff in 1973. During his tenure with the Division, he has participated in the conduct of both financial & compliance and performance audits and has had a variety of administrative responsibilities. He has also served as an adjunct professor on the faculty of the University of Kansas, teaching a performance auditing course.

Meredith is a charter member and past President of the Topeka Chapter of the Association of Government Accountants. As the Association's current President-Elect, Meredith chairs the Finance and Budget Board and sits on the National Executive Committee.

Have We Lost One of Your Colleagues?

Although membership renewal this year is running better than last year at this time, there are still a significant number of our colleagues who have not paid their dues for the year beginning October 1. As a result their benefits ceased after the publication of last month's newsletter. National office is sending follow-up billings to these individuals and the Chapter's Membership Services Committee has just mailed a letter to each member on the suspense list. If you are or become aware of anyone in this group please encourage them to re-up.

Proposed Bylaws Change

Recently Terry Conway, President of the Washington Chapter, left Government service. Article VI, Section 1,c. of the Chapter's bylaws reads in part as follows:

"No member shall be nominated for or serve as President or President-Elect of the Chapter unless such otherwise eligible person is an employee of a government (Federal, state, municipal or local) or is a retired Government employee not presently working for a commercial organization. (Approved May 1979)..."

Accordingly, President Conway has temporarily stepped down from the Presidency while the issue of employment status of the President is brought before the membership as a whole. The reason why the Chapter Executive Committee (CEC) feels it essential to poll the membership is that the members who have come forth and informally expressed an opinion appear equally divided for and against a change.

Therefore, in accordance with Article XIV of the Chapter bylaws the CEC is requesting all members to express their preference on how this situation, and any future occurrence of this nature should be handled. Votes on the following proposal must be received by January 31, 1988.

Proposal

In the first sentence of Article VI, Section 1,c. the words "or serve as" would be deleted, thus removing restrictions as to employment for an otherwise eligible member to serve as President or President-Elect, but, retain all current restrictions as to employment at time of nomination. This proposed amendment would be retroactive to July 1, 1987.

Each member should vote "Yes" if in favor of this amendment "No" if not in favor.

At the conclusion of the balloting if the proposal is approved, President Conway will reassume the duties of President. If the proposal is rejected, President Conway would resign and President-Elect Bray would become President.

ABOUT CHAPTER MEMBERS

We were saddened to learn of the death in September of Francis X. (Frank) LaCava in Charlottesville, Virginia. Mr. LaCava, a Treasury retiree, was Washington Chapter President for the 1974-75 program year, and recipient of the 1973 award for Outstanding Contribution to the Washington Chapter. His citation noted his "dedication and hard work over several years of active participation in Chapter activities". (We couldn't help but note that Mr. LaCava was one of our predecessor newsletter editors; his service includes a two year stint in that capacity.) Our deepest sympathy to Mr. LaCava's family with profound gratitude for his dedicated service to AGA and the Washington Chapter.

You probably read the item in the December Topics about the AICPA honoring Andrew Barr as one of "14 Who Made a Difference" in the accounting profession over the past century. Because we are all so very proud of Mr. Barr, we will be forgiven, we are sure, for wanting to be certain that everyone knows and understands that Mr. Barr is a member of Washington Chapter. In fact, Mr. Barr, a charter member of AGA (certificate #14), has the rare distinction of being listed in the records of AGA as being simultaneously National President and Washington Chapter President (1953-54). This is the result of Washington Chapter's role as the Mother Chapter of AGA. From 1950, when the Association was founded, until the national organization was set up in 1956, Washington Chapter served as both the national organization and the local chapter.

Daisy, a recognized expert in financial reporting, is not, however, quitting the profession; she plans now to devote more time to her church's fiscal affairs, and to be more active in AGA. EXEC MEET NOTES

Following are items of interest from the October 15 Chapter Executive Committee meeting.

—The Budget was unanimously passed by the Board. Board members and chairpersons may exceed their approved budgets by not more than 10% without Board approval.

—The luncheon item on the Budget has been increased from \$15,194 to \$16,209 due to a price increase by the Touchdown Club. Luncheon cost is \$14 plus a 17% gratuity per lunch plus a bar set up fee of \$20. It was decided that the Board will absorb the increase. Judith Parsons is negotiating with the Club on the price increase.

—Dan McGrath reported that membership appears split on the issue of a non-government employee being President of the Chapter. The special Committee will review the problem and report back to the Board with a recommendation. If changes to the By-laws are needed, they will be voted on by the general membership. (See article this issue.)

—The Research Committee is working on two projects: the Financial Management Training Survey and the Capital Budgeting in the Federal Government Survey. For the former, survey forms have been sent to private organizations to see which courses they use in training their employees. For the latter, survey forms have been sent to major agencies including DOD, HHS, and HUD. —We have reached 65% of the 5,000 point Chapter

—We have reached 65% of the 5,000 point Chapter Recognition goal set for us by the National Office. However, we have set our own goal of 10,000 points.

RESEARCH COMMITTEE REPORT

The Chapter's Research Committee is currently chaired by Chuck McAndrew, a Systems Evaluation Manager in the Financial Systems Evaluation Division of the Navy's Office of Comptroller. Committee members are Dr. David Parriser, CPA, an Evaluator in GAO's Resources and Economic Development Division and a Professor of Accounting at Catholic University; Joel Dorfman, Certified Management Accountant, who works in the Information Technology Group of Arthur Young's Federal Financial Management Systems Division; Joyce Charles, an Assistant Director in the Department of Labor IG's Office of Financial Management Audit; and Mary Lee Mason, a Senior Advisor with Treasury's Financial Management Service.

Joyce and Dave are developing a "Compendium of Training Courses Offered in the Washington Metropolitan Area". They are surveying about 50 organizations to gather information on available financial management training courses.

Joel and Mary Lee have completed a project to determine "Capital Budgeting Techniques in the Federal Government". The project's results are based on a survey to which most major agencies responded. The survey questions were geared to determining: which agencies perform capital budgeting; which components within agencies perform capital budgeting; whether financial analyses of expenditure proposals are developed; the types of expenditures to which capital budgeting techniques are applied; the percentage of total capital assets to which the techniques are applied; how inflation is taken into account; whether central agency guidance is used; and whether capital budgeting policies and procedures are documented.

Joe Rothschild, HUD IG Director of Policy and Planning, has been our liaison with the AGA National Research Committee. He has developed a "Research Reference Aid for the Public Sector (RRAPS)". This microcomputer application system provides an annotated report reference for all types of evaluation reports and guidelines, e.g., audits, consulting studies, management evaluations, internal control reviews, risk analyses, A-176 studies, field performance reviews, and inspections. RRAPS can be accessed by subject classification. RRAPS is available to any agency which wishes to use it. The user must have dBASE III software and an IBM-compatible microcomputer. There is no charge but the user must supply a disk onto which the software can be copied. For more information on RRAPS, call Brenda Montgomery at HUD (426-6493).

DID YOU KNOW...

The Peace Corps has successfully tested a new management approach in its accounting division, borrowing from the works of world-renowned economist Dr. W. Edwards Deming. This modern approach has been successfully used in Japan for years to increase the quality of the product and productivity. Using this new approach, accounting systems and processes are continuously managed to improve quality and increase productivity.

The test focused on the processing of readjustment allowance checks paid to Peace Corps volunteers upon completion of their overseas service. This allowance accrues at the rate of \$175 per month and is invaluable in helping volunteers readjust to life after spending two years or more in a developing country. Using the Deming approach, the number of accounting errors in preparing the checks was reduced substantially. At one step of the process, for example, the defective rate was reduced to less than one-fifth of its previous level. At another stage, the defective rate was reduced from 9% to 0. The reduced number of accounting errors has enabled returning Peace Corps volunteers to receive the checks, vital to their readjustment, in a more timely manner.

The cornerstone of the approach is that as quality increases, so does productivity because less

rework is necessary. This relationship was confirmed by the results of the test project which included savings of more than 11 weeks of staff time in rework and inspection in a five-month period from December 15, 1985 through May 15, 1987.

Management commitment and involvement is the first critical step toward successful implementation of the Deming approach. Project managers met regularly to detail steps in the system and to consider emloyees' suggestions for improvements. Using statistical tools, employees reviewed their own performance and made recommendations for improvement based on their day-to-day experiences. These have proven invaluable to managers of the pilot project, where employees have compiled a list of 38 recommendations for improved operations. All of these were approved by management and their implementation has had a positive impact on the quality of the work performed.

Ronald Passero, Peace Corps' Director for Financial Management, lauded the outcome of the project. "We are very pleased with the improved quality of work resulting from the test project. The employee involvement model we used is the only one I've ever seen really work. In addition, we made a breakthrough in being able to predict levels of quality in our volunteer allowance system."
