



Maintaining your CGFM - Did You Know?

- All active CGFMs are required to complete at least 80 hours of continuing professional education (CPE) every two years in government financial management topics or related technical subjects. The 80 CPE hours must be completed within the CGFM's two-year CPE cycle. The CPE cycle is determined by the CGFM award year.
- Active CGFMs are required to maintain supporting documentation on CPE hours earned for a minimum of three years and provide it to AGA upon request. This documentation may be requested by AGA as part of an annual audit of a random sample of CGFMs.

AGA's CGFM Modules 2 and 3 study guides are now on-line

You can now access CGFM Study Guides 2 and 3 on the go! Read, search and review the study guide content on your laptop, tablet or phone — a convenient way to prepare for the CGFM Examinations. Upon purchasing the online version, you'll have immediate access to the entire publication for a period of 12 months. In addition, if a newer version of this study guide is published within this period, you'll also have access to the new version! An on-line version of module 1 will be available soon. Preparing the FMS-2108 Year-End Closing Statement


Background

or years, agencies have produced the FMS-2108 Year-End Closing Statement to show the cash withdrawn from cancelling funds and reconciling their cash balances at Treasury with their budgetary account

balances. Previous mappings of the Standard General Ledger (SGL) to the FMS-2108 had a number of different options based on the type of authority used by the fund. For FY2014, Treasury has come up with a single, consolidated mapping of SGL accounts to the various columns. This should help agencies prepare the statement. Some might want to prepare the statement during the year to find any problems early, but that would require mapping accounts that should be zero at year end.

Basic Definition

This is a summary of the definition provided by Treasury. For funds without borrowing and contract authority, columns 3, 4, and 5 will be zero. If they have no investments, then only proprietary cash (generally just 101000 Fund Balance with Treasury) will be in columns 2 and 6.



Column 11 can actually be calculated as column 6+7+8-9-10. If that formula does not work, then the FMS-2108 is not in balance. I recommend that clients who generate this report out of their trial balances or accounting system add at least one more column which shows the difference between column 11 based on the GL account balances shown above and based on the formula above. If this column has a zero balance then all is well.

Common Pitfalls

There are three common problems which cause Column 11 to be out of balance, and one rare problem. The rare problem is debits and credits do not balance for budgetary GL accounts within Treasury Symbol. If your agency has this problem, you are no doubt already addressing it, as this will affect practically all your reports.

If budgetary accounts are in balance, then the only possible sources of discrepancy are with the budgetary accounts not included on the FMS-2108. There are three kinds: cash, anticipations, and temporary. Amounts temporarily unavailable (SGL 438400, 438700, 438800, and 439500) will have zero balance at year end, and so are excluded from the report. However, if an agency runs the report during the year to check for imbalances,

it will be necessary to include these. I suggest using a new column to separately identify them. It will also assist agencies in ensuring these balances are zero as year end approaches.

Cash is represented by the proprietary accounts, so any discrepancy caused by excluding cash budgetary accounts (most commonly 411900, 422200, 425200, 426000, 480200 and 490200) would point to a disconnect between proprietary and budgetary cash account balances. I discussed this in my April, 2010 column. If the discrepancy is caused by a timing difference, set up a special payable or receivable sub-account to hold the timing difference and report this in a separate column (e.g., if a payment voucher for advance posts dr. 14100000 480100000 cr. 21100014 48020000 and confirming the schedule posts dr. 21100014 cr. 10100000, then 21100014 would represent the timing difference). Otherwise, add all proprietary cash account balances and subtract the budgetary cash balances to calculate the discrepancy in cash.

The anticipated resource accounts (403200 thru 407000, 412000, 416000, 416500, 418300, 421500, and 431000) should have the same debit balance as the credit balance in anticipated status accounts (459000 and 469000). Place these accounts' balances in a new column to identify any discrepancy among anticipations.

Analysis Columns

Combining these recommendations, you could add these new columns to the report to analyze the cause of any discrepancies (see table below). While Treasury shows the report as a new row for each symbol and all the amounts for a symbol arrayed across columns, I usually define the amounts as rows on the report with a new page for each Treasury Symbol to facilitate printing and reading.

Conclusion

The FMS-2108 is the original tie-point report, comparing the budgetary available amount to proprietary cash and investments. However, it is built with the assumption that it is only run right before closing the books. If agencies want to run the report to check for imbalances during the year, they may need to add some more accounts to the report definition. Adding new columns to capture common problems will also aid the analysis.
