### **LUNCHEON SPEAKER**



Mr. G. Martin Wagner

Our luncheon speaker will be Mr. G. Martin (Marty) Wagner. Mr. Wagner's permanent position is Deputy Commissioner, Information Technology Service, General Services Administration. He is currently serving as Cochair of the Federal Electronic Commerce - Program Management Office (ECA-PMO). This Office, which functions under the auspices of the Office of Federal Procurement Policy, Office of Management and Budget, has the responsibility for ensuring that the government has in place an infrastructure that will enable the accomplishment of the objectives of the Presidential Memorandum of October 26, 1993, entitled, "Streamlining Procurement Through Electronic Commerce." Mr. Wagner's presentation is timely in that July, 1995 represents an important milestone date in the Presidential Memorandum, and agency finance offices will need to be sure they are prepared.

Prior to his current position at GSA, Marty Wagner served as Deputy Commissioner of the Information Resources Management Service, where he was responsible for government-wide programs for acquisition and management of telecommunications and computer equipment, systems, and services. Previously he was Director of the Treasury Department's Office of Telecommunications Management. He oversaw the Department's voice and data communications strategy. In 1988, Mr. Wagner managed the interagency group evaluating the management proposals for Federal Telecommunications System (FTS2000). Before that he spent two years at OMB as issue manager for all government telecommunications. In the eight years prior to his tenure at OMB, Mr. Wagner was at the Environmental Protection Agency where he managed the agency's economic studies of environmental regulation of energy industries.

Mr. Wagner has bachelor's and master's degrees in Engineering from Princeton University. He also has a master's in Economics and Public Policy from Princeton's Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs.

### SUMMARY OF LUNCHEON SPEAKER'S REMARKS . . . . . . . . by Cis Kuennen, Secretary

Mr. Edward DeSeve, the Presidential nominee for Controller of the Office of Management and Budget, spoke at our January luncheon meeting. Mr. DeSeve selected the theme of "Keep on Truckin'..." The topic seemed especially pertinent in the realm of financial management today. As financial managers and taxpayers, we are facing the fundamental questions of public finance: "Who gets what and who pays for it?" Taxpayers and governments at all levels are grappling with the basic issues of the role of government, the cost, and the results.

The challenge for financial managers is to define our role. Mr. DeSeve recommended all financial managers get copies of the CFOs' and IGs' vision statements. They help set out the relationship between financial managers and program managers. Financial managers must provide useful and timely financial information in order to answer the question of what taxpayers are getting for their money. Mr. DeSeve said each of our organizations should be prepared to answer what goods or services they're providing at what costs while Congress debates the question of what government should provide. Financial managers have the role of bringing vital program and financial information together in a meaningful way. We must embrace this role if we are to manage change.

Mr. DeSeve, alluding to an article by Hal Steinberg recently published for the AICPA, said he believes that we are in a time of continuity in financial management. This continuity began in the late 1980's when reforms

spawned requirements for better financial systems, higher quality information, and more accountability. It continued with the CFO Act and the GPRA's and GPMA's emphasis on performance standards and results. With changes in A-11, if organizations can well-define their mission and performance they will stand a better chance in the budget process. The continuity chain moves on now with the NPR's "Phase II" call for bold ideas. After finding that many of our present systems, built on the premises of mistrust and centralized, micromanagement, are too expensive to maintain and counterproductive, the call will go forward for new financial and operational systems, ones based on trust, opportunity, and performance. In the future, the axiom will be "If there's performance, there will be resources and flexibility."

As the government-wide assessment of continues, the Vice-President will once again ask Departments and Agencies to examine their core missions. We will be challenged to look carefully outside of our operational roles to identify functions that can be privatized, terminated, or performed in a better way in order to accomplish the fundamental governmental restructuring that the American public is demanding. As financial managers and taxpayers, we have the unique insight and opportunity to look at how our missions are funded; whether we should continue; or if someone else could accomplish them better. In the meantime, we should all remember to "Keep on Truckin'..." in these difficult times of challenge, change, and opportunity.



### MEMBER PROFILES



Evelyn A. Brown is currently the Acting Chief, Financial Reporting in the Office of the Secretary (OST), Department of Transportation. Prior to her current position, she was Chief, Accounting Services, also at OST.

Evelyn has also worked at the Department of Commerce. There she held the position of Director of Accounting in the International Trade Administration and previously was a supervisory accountant in the Maritime Administration.

Earlier in DOT Evelyn was Chief, General Accounting and Chief, Financial Systems in the Federal Transit Administration.

Since joining the Washington Chapter of the Association of Government Accountants in 1974, Evelyn has been one of its very active members. She has served as secretary, co-chair of programs, membership director, and VITA volunteer and has worked in various capacities on several other committees. She is currently president-elect of the Washington Chapter and is heading up the Chapter's participation in enlisting applications for AGA's Certified Government Financial Manager program.

At the national level, she has served on the International Affairs Committee and the Membership Committee. She also co-chaired the Banquet Committee for the 1994 PDC.

Russell D. Morris was appointed Commissioner of the Financial Management Service (FMS) on September 9, 1991. This bureau of the Department of the Treasury fulfills the Treasury Department responsibility for providing leadership and direction to the rest of Government in financial management matters and operates the Government's financial infrastructure.

Prior to this assignment, Russ was the FMS Deputy Commissioner. He began his career with FMS in 1980 as the Assistant Commissioner Banking and Cash Management. He worked for the U. S. Postal Service, the Federal Reserve Board and a regional commercial bank in various management and executive positions prior to coming to FMS.

Russ is a member of the Senior Executive service; he holds a Ph.D. in Business Administration from Ohio State University, and teaches financial management at Georgetown University. He is a frequent speaker and author on financial management. He has served as a member of the AGA PDC Program Committee and currently serves as the Washington Chapter's program director.

In June 1988, he was a recipient of the first Award for Government Management Excellence presented by the President's Council on Management Improvement.

### SOUTHWEST MAKES ITS MOVES WITH EBT

With the piloting of the new Electronic Benefit Transfer (EBT) system of delivering Food Stamp benefits in Texas, the Southwest is actively working toward the President's goal of a nationwide system. Oklahoma, Louisiana, New Mexico, and Kansas have recently come together as a consortium to publish a Request for Proposal to bid for such a system for various public assistance programs, and Arkansas is deliberating with the Southeast Alliance of States for the same.

One of the main concerns that accountants/auditors will confront in the future under EBT is the impact of Regulation E as amended by the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System. Regulation E implements the Electronic Fund Transfer Act (EFTA) which covers any electronic fund transfer initiated through an automated teller machine (ATM), point-of-sale (POS) terminal, and other electronic transfers.

Currently, the Board supports coverage of EBT programs under EFTA and the regulations, but will delay compliance until March 1, 1997, to provide for adequate time to prepare. The regulations limit a consumer's liability for unauthorized transfers to \$50 under certain conditions. While private sector institutions handle such losses by spreading them over their entire customer base in the form of increased fees or reduced interest paid, agencies can not do so. The losses would be paid out of tax revenues or reduced benefits which is not permitted under some programs. The Board is not convinced that the data submitted by

public commenters on the expected cost of this liability on government agencies is definitive, and therefore, granted the delay as requested by the Federal EBT Task Force. During this moratorium, the Task Force and State agencies will closely monitor Regulation E's economic impact as a basis for seeking legislative authorization and funding for replacing benefits lost due to unauthorized transfers.

Another concern facing Federal accountants/auditors will be the issue of cost effectiveness. The Mickey Leland Memorial Domestic Hunger Relief Act of 1990 amended the Food Stamp Act to propose a requirement that EBT systems be cost neutral to the Federal government. Specifically, the operation costs, amortized capital expenditures, and reasonable start-up costs cannot exceed the costs of the coupon issuance system that will be replaced. The U.S. Department of Agriculture believes the best implementation of this requirement is to base the issuance "cap" on the cost of each State agency's coupon issuance cost level and the related Federal coupon issuance costs. A cost analysis must be completed and verified for each State system. Any costs a State agency incurs that exceed the "cap" would not be reimbursed by the Federal government, but absorbed by the State. Fortunately, the State agencies in the Southwest are not letting these potential cost issues hinder progress and other benefits of EBT, such as increased operational efficiency, improved service to benefit recipients, and improved program integrity and accountability of public funds.

Beginning in 1994, SSA instituted a new relocation policy aimed at boosting the proportion of relocation homes sold by transferees. Transferees who successfully market and close on their homes would receive a relocation incentive award. By making it unnecessary for the relocation contractor to acquire the home and incur carrying costs, thereby causing a smaller management fee to be charged to SSA, such transferees save SSA considerable money. SSA therefore put in place a gainsharing mechanism not only to reward their efforts, but to provide a strong incentive to all transferees to undertake such efforts.

Because no such mechanism exists yet in federal travel reimbursement procedures, SSA developed its own solution. Utilizing authority under Title 5 of the U.S. Code, SSA developed a new Special Act or Service Award which recognized the tangible savings garnered by the transferees by their home sale efforts.

The results have been gratifying. In the first nine months of operation, the program has paid 67 incentive awards for home sale transactions that resulted in direct savings to SSA of \$931,478—savings achieved through reductions in management fees SSA would otherwise have had to pay to a contractor. The proportion of transferees who extended the effort to market their homes—rather than depend upon the contractor to buy their property—rose dramatically since inception of the program: from an historical average of 32 percent, to 60 percent in the first nine months of 1994. This is clear evidence of the effectiveness of gainsharing in reducing government travel costs.

### Other Applications for the Gainsharing Concept

The gainsharing concept could be utilized in other areas of travel management. An excellent candidate would be lump-sum travel payments, which could replace, or serve as an option for, the traditional reimbursement method of

covering actual travel costs.

Temporary living expenses, for example, constitute one of the costliest per capita components of relocation benefits in the government. During a permanent change of station, transferring employees may claim lodgings and per diem for themselves and family members. Typically, employees will claim the greater portion of maximum amounts allowable, because they have no reason or incentive, to hold costs down.

The government could develop an appropriate lump-sum benefit, based upon a percentage--70 percent, for example--of the standard daily rate of \$66 now in effect, as a substitute for actual expense claims. The main point is that the employee choosing the lump-sum option need not

keep receipts or voucher for reimbursement, and need not refer to daily expense caps/limits.

Instead, they would be expected to live on the lump-sum provided. Any additional needs would have to be met out-of-pocket. However, if the employee was frugal and lived on less than the lump-sum allotment, the employee would retain the balance.

Agencies utilizing this option would not only save money on temporary living expenses (provided the lump-sum amount was properly calculated), but would also save by not having to audit temporary living vouchers, and would have transferees who settle in more quickly at their new duty stations.


