PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dan can determine if the person is affiliated with another AGA chapter, and, if not, an invitation to join AGA, along with a membership application, will be sent to the person. Attracting new members is imperative to maintain an active, vigorous Chapter. In order to sustain our leadership role in government financial management and offer the benefits we enjoy as Washington Chapter members, it is vital that we draw in and retain new, active members.

At a recent TGIF luncheon I was asked to recount the benefits of AGA membership and the contributions our Chapter has made to improving government financial management. It was easy, I simply mentioned:

- Our employment referral program through which vacancy notices can be obtained by contacting Vern Isenberg on 447-6090 or by attending our monthly luncheon meetings.
- Our scholarship and student recognition program, and our awards program recognizing those who have made significant contributions to government financial management.
- Our education program, including this year, the TGIF luncheon series and workshops on credit management; microcomputers; Federal financial reporting; and basic governmental accounting, budgeting, and auditing.
- Our informative Newsletter and luncheon programs featuring topical financial management speeches given by prominent guest speakers.
- Our research program, which includes such projects as developing a compendium of financial management training courses available in the Washington area, and developing a profile of financial/economic analyses methods used by Federal

agencies to make long-term investment and financing decisions, including decisions on the acquisitions of capital assets and leasing versus purchasing.

 Our efforts to improve the public's perception of government workers through membership in the Public Employees' Roundtable, which is about to mount a major campaign to advertise the contributions of public servants.

- Our service to the community in such activities as the volunteer income tax assistance program, our course for small businesses, the speakers bureau that we are in the process of establishing (a speaker's profile for persons interested in participating as a speaker is published elsewhere in this issue), and our willingness to provide assistance and instruction to individuals and groups on financial matters.
- Foremost among the benefits of AGA membership, is the opportunity to meet, exchange ideas, and work with others associated with governmental financial management. We are fortunate in that many of the leading government officials, academicians, and private practitioners concerned with financial management in government are longstanding members of our Chapter.

An additional incentive for recruiting new members is the monetary awards program established by National AGA. The individual who sponsors the most new members will be awarded \$200, and the second highest sponsor will be awarded \$150 (both must sponsor over 20 new members by April 30 to qualify). Anyone else sponsoring over 20 new members will be awarded \$100, persons sponsoring from 16 to 20 new members will receive \$75, and persons sponsoring 11 to 15 new members will be awarded \$50. These awards will be presented at this year's Professional Development Conference in Baltimore.

ANSWERS TO YOUR QUESTIONS

by Larry Stout Treasury, Financial Management Service

This month's column provides information and answers questions about the Financial Analysis Program, of the Financial Management Service.

Q: What is the Financial Management Services' Financial Analysis Program?

A: The Financial Analysis Program was originated to take advantage of the wealth of financial and accounting data available to the Treasury Department. The goal of the project is to develop standardized guidelines and financial models for evaluating and strengthening financial management in the Federal government. Some short term objectives are to:

- Establish a governmentwide financial data base accessible to central agencies and program agencies alike.
- Create analytical tools for monitoring financial performance.
- Increase agency awareness of existing strengths and weaknesses in their own financial systems programs, and
- enhance the integrity of financial information reported to Treasury.

The long term objectives are to: 1) institutionalize a government self-assessment program in financial management by the end of fiscal year 1989, and, 2) increase the usefulness of accounting systems to decision-makers by closing the gap between budgeting decision systems and traditional program accounting.

Q: Is this project being carried out solely by the Treasury Department?

A: The project is carried out jointly—by the Treasury Department with OMB participation and other Federal agencies. Treasury coordinates the program out of the Financial Management Services' Accounting Group. An interagency group has been formed to participate in the development of financial models useful to agency managers. Agencies participating include: Departments of Defense, Agriculture, Transportation, Housing and Urban Development, Health and Human Services, Energy, and Education; The Environmental Protection Agency, Small Business Administration, Internal Revenue Service, Veterans Administration, and the National Transportation Safety Board.

Q: What financial information will be analyzed?

A: The early work will concentrate on Receivables, Credit Information, and balance sheet data. Next the program will target other accounting and related financial data produced in the Federal government, e.g., other schedules relating to the balance sheet as well as cash accounting data now resident in Treasury's Central Accounting System.

Q: Will analysis and financial modeling become available as part of the automated system?

A: Yes, the Treasury-maintained Federal Agencies' Financial Reports (FAFR) and Schedule 9 data bases have been selected for the development of the initial analytical models.

Q: What type of equipment will be needed to access this system?

A: Agencies will access this information directly using personal computers (PCs) or terminals. PC software will be developed by te Interageny Financial Analysis Working Group with a selection of models available according to the needs of different managers.

Q: Can an agency volunteer to become part of the interagency group?



COVER STORY: BEHIND THE SCENES IN TELEVISION BROADCASTING

(Editor's note: Ms. Susan King, Anchorwoman, Channel 4 News—Live at 6 P.M. and Cover Story, Channel 4 News—Live at 11 P.M., was the featured speaker at the Chapter's December 5 luncheon meeting. Following is a synopsis of her appearance as developed by David Dukes, Chapter Program Director.)

Ms. King opened her remarks by stating that, with Mcfarland's resignation as President Reagan's national security affairs advisor, no one from the original White House team remains. As a result, we have now entered into a post-Reagan era. She provided a brief, but interesting, political analysis of the 1988 contenders for President, but did not venture an outcome.

Ms. King spoke on her varied personal experiences in the search for news and gave an interesting account of how the news is prepared and how technology has changed newscasting during the past ten years.

Ms. King exhibited a personal magnetism and enthusiasm which was both refreshing and infectious.

In appreciation for her appearance, the Chapter authorized a check for \$200 which was sent to Ms. King's alma mater, Marymount College of Tarrytown, New York, to which Ms. King said she owed much.

NEWS FROM NATIONAL

TAX HANDBOOK ORDERS AGAIN SET NEW RECORD Prentice-Hall shipped 3,183 of their tax handbooks to chapters and at-large members in mid-December, with this year's total just barely exceeding last year's 3,163. This maintains our record of achieving a new high total every year since beginning this program some seven years ago. Northern Virginia topped all chapter orders for the third straight year, with 132, barely nosing out Washington's order of 130 copies. Other chapters receiving 100 copies or more were Nashville, at 120; Atlanta, with 113; and New York, with an even 100.

KIRKENDALL NOMINATED TO PRESIDENT-ELECT POST Donald E. Kirkendall of the Montgomery-Prince Georges Chapter has been named as the "single-slate" candidate for president-elect of AGA by the National Nominations Committee. Thirteen regional vice presidents-elect were also named, as well as a regional vice president in the Texas-Oklahoma region where there was a vacancy. Details of all candidates are carried in the January issue of TOPICS newsletter, and were announced in National Office Memo 86-06. All officer positions are subject to additional petition nominations as governed by AGA bylaws, which must be filed by February 15.

Supplanting the former chapter competition plan, the recognition program measures a chapter's operational efficiency and effectiveness against a desirable goal rather than against other chapters. It is planned that chapter recognition point totals for each chapter at mid-year will be carried in the February issue of TOPICS. Chapters are urged to give emphasis to their chapter recognition reporting to the National Office so that totals can be maintained in current status.

BECAUSE IT CONCERNS ME . . .

Twenty four years ago this month, I began working for the Federal government. I had not even thought about working for the government before I was recruited. Everything in school was geared towards public accounting. I was idealistic in those days and considered working for the government a patriotic act.

I soon learned to love working for the government. I valued the independence and security government employment gave me. All I had to do was the right thing. I did not have to kiss up to my bosses. I did not have to follow dumb orders which did not result in doing the right thing. That is the ultimate in independence and security.

I was happily going about my career thinking the only duty I had was to follow the laws duly passed by the Congress and signed by the President. Along came candidate Jimmy Carter who insulted me because I was a Federal employee. He said I wasn't patriotic just because I worked for the government and that I wasn't responsive as an employee. This hurt deeply because I always felt my duty was to follow duly passed and signed laws. But this was not what Mr. Carter meant. He meant Federal employees were not responsive to their boss' wishes. President Carter was successful in obtaining passage of the Civil Service Reform Act of 1978.

Both Presidents Carter and Reagan have emphasized a new role for Federal employees. No longer can we simply do the right thing. Now we must try to do whatever the boss asks (unless it's illegal). Under good people the difference is small, under others it's a chasm.

I'm trying to express here some very fundamental feelings that I've long had about myself and government service. I'm trying to express these thoughts because I'm losing my bearings from earlier principles. The law now basically requires me to be responsive to the boss. But we all know the boss does not always ask us only to do the right thing. I'm torn between following the law and following my conscience. This conflict should not exist and something is broken besides my

DID YOU KNOW . . . By Charles McAndrew

—This month we are featuring 3 CPA firms and their latest financial management and systems development activities. In a future month, we will again feature at least two or three other CPA firms.

—Arthur Young & Company (AY) provides extensive analytical, audit, review, and support services on a regular basis to agencies throughout the federal government. The Washington office is the focal point for these services. Current work is centered in the areas of information system planning; productivity and work measurement studies; internal control and accounting system evaluations; financial audits; and financial/accounting systems development and review.

—The passage of the Federal Managers' Financial Integrity Act of 1982 (FMFIA) required all federal agencies to concentrate increased efforts on internal control and accounting system evaluations. Arthur Young has been involved since passage of the Act in supporting federal agencies in reviewing, improving and reporting on internal controls. Support has also been provided for accounting system reviews under Section 4 of the Act, including quality assurance reviews, reviews of conformance with the Comptroller General's principles and standards, identification of material system weaknesses, and development of both short-term and long-term recommendations for improvements.

-In an effort to reduce evaluation resources and time, AY recently conducted a combined Sections 2 and

4 evaluation of one agency subsystem to simultaneously assure compliance with the two sections of the Federal Managers' Financial Integrity Act. This new approach worked well and should prove effective in reviewing the internal control aspects of other agency accounting systems.

—For further information, call Joe Donlon 828-7020. Arthur Andersen & Co. (AA) is currently using the leading edge of technology to serve government. In its engagement for the Securities and Exchange Commission. AA implemented an electronic data gathering, analysis and retrieval system. The system referred to as EDGAR allows SEC registrant to file electronically rather than on paper EDGAR receives filings from corporations via tape, word processing diskette or directly over telephone lines. If the filing is sent via diskette, it may be sent in any of 85 formats from over 50 different manufacturers' word processing machines. EDGAR converts the various formats to a standard, print image format. If the filing is transmitted over phone lines, it may be sent via asynchronous, bisynchronous or SDLC protocols at 1200 baud to 4800 baud speeds.

—EDGAR is currently operating as a pilot with approximately 225 corporations participating on a voluntary basis. The system will be enhanced continually until 1986 when the pilot is scheduled to end. At that point all 12,000 publicly held companies which are SEC registrants will begin to use the system.

e——AA is also a member of the team that recently developed and installed the Automated Collection System (ACS) at the Internal Revenue Service. The other members of the team are G.C. Services Corporation, IBM and Rockwell International. ACS is a prime example of using technology to provide state-of-the-art collection processing.

—ACS is a computerized telephone system that helps collection agents contact and follow up wth delinquent taxpayers. ACS uses features such as maintaining delinquent accounts directly on the terminal, dynamic scheduling, autodialing, system-generated correspondence and security to reduce manual effort and the providing of rapid access to information. ACS also provides comprehensive management reporting and a hands-on interactive training program.

—AA initially was responsible for the development of the application software, training and user procedures. Then AA implemented the system and application software and trained all personnel at each of 30 ACS sites in the IRS.

—Peat Marwick (PM) has developed an innovative and highly efficient and effective approach to evaluating internal controls in Federal agencies' program activities. It is based on SEADOC, the third-generation internal control evaluation approach PM uses when examining financial statements.

The process calls for:

Identifying the objective of the activity;

 identifying the transaction cycles with which the activity is performed;

 determining the objectives for each transaction cycle and eliminating those transaction cycles that would have a minimum effect on accomplishment of the activity's internal control objectives;

determining how the transaction cycle is performed and listing the procedures and documents with which it is performed;

 establishing control objectives for each procedure and document;

· determining what control techniques are used to

accomplish each control objective;

 developing an evaluation plan to ascertain the degree to which the control techniques are applied;
 and

 carrying out the work plan to make the determination of whether the system is working as intended.

—The approach has been undertaken at the Department of Housing and Urban Development for several parts of the single family housing program. The ease of the approach, combined with the manner in which it uncovers weaknesses in internal controls that should be operating in the program, have demonstrated the desirability of replicating the approach in other program activities.
