



ACCOUNTABILITY REMINDERS

As Government of Guam entities complete or are nearing completion of their financial audits, here's a friendly reminder of the "Citizen-Centric Report" (CCR) submission requirements:

Public Law 30-127

CCRs are mandated by law to be completed by each government of Guam entity. Entities shall submit an annual Citizen-Centric Report: (1) via .pdf email attachment; (2) to the Public Auditor of Guam and the Speaker of the Guam Legislature; (3) no later than 60 calendar days after the release of the entity's independent audit report; and (4) to be posted on the entity's website.

Completed CCRs are encouraged to be submitted to AGA National where a team will review and provide constructive feedback on ways to make your report more informative and meaningful. Additionally, well designed and informative CCRs can also be considered for the AGA Certificate of Excellence*. Just complete the application (see sample below) and send it and a digital copy of your CCR to AGA at ccr@agacgfm.org. Click here for more details on the judging guidelines.

Poklonskii, an immigrant to the U.S. in 2018 from Kazakhstan, said his generation would be open to government jobs if they knew about them. "Serving the country is one of the best ways to make a difference. That's what I'm passionate about. Everyone at school says, Big Four audit firms are the only way to go,' but it's just one way. Government needs to come in with better marketing and promote the opportunities available and what government can offer, like pensions, resources, interesting positions.



RESEARCH AND STANDARDS

GASB Statement No. 87 - Leases

A significant change to your financial statements may be required for the upcoming September 30, 2022 fiscal year end. Government Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 87 – *Leases* will have the effect of recording almost all lease transactions in your government's statement of net position. Here is a summary of what you should know.

Overall impact: Both lessors and lessees will recognize leases in its statement of net position. For lessees, this results in the recognition of a lease asset and a corresponding lease liability. For lessors, this results in the recognition of a lease receivable and a deferred inflow of resources. These amounts are calculated as the present value of lease payments for the *lease term* using the applicable *discount rate*.

Effective Date: reporting periods beginning after June 15, 2021.

Definition of a lease: a contract that conveys control of the right to use another entity's nonfinancial asset as specified in the contract for a period of time in an exchange or exchange-like transaction.

Lease Term: the period during which a lessee has a noncancelable right. This can include option periods to extend the lease if it is reasonably certain.

Discount rate: should use the interest rate the lessor charges the lessee, which may be the rate implicit in the lease. If this is not available, the lessee's estimated incremental borrowing rate should be used.

Exceptions: 1) short term leases with maximum possible terms of 12 months or less, including any options to extend, 2) leases where the capitalization amount is less than the entity's capitalization threshold and 3) certain regulated leases as outlined in the standard.

Transition: changes should be applied retroactively by restating financial statements, if practicable, for all prior periods presented.

This is only a brief overview. A reading of the Statement No. 87 is highly encouraged as it covers more topics such as consideration for lease modifications and sale leaseback transactions.

It is recommended that governments first take an inventory of all lease contract agreements for building, land, vehicles, and equipment and place it in a database that includes key details such term, payments, escalations and discount rate. Discussions within management and your auditor is important to ensure a smooth adoption.





Depending on a person's natural interests and goals, many circumstances can lead them to a particular academic area. If an undergraduate were to ask me about what field to major in, I would recommend accounting because it offers various career paths. There will always be a demand for accountants in businesses, governments, and nonprofit organizations. Many individuals are discouraged by the rigorous studying and prerequisites the program requires, but as I near the finish line and my graduation date, I can assure those who are interested in accounting that it will be well worth it if they chose to pursue it. If someone is still unsure or lacks the confidence to commit, I am more than willing to provide some advice and recommendations on how to achieve in an accounting major.

Learning something new is always difficult the first time around, and everyone learns at their own pace. Practice, in my opinion, is the best method to get proficient in accounting. Practice all of the major accounting principles and concepts and try to apply them to real-world settings. When I originally learned about debits and credits in my first accounting class, I was perplexed, but after practicing and using real-world examples, I quickly grasped the concept. It's a tedious way of memorizing concepts to say that debits reduce liabilities and credits increase it. When I was studying the issue, I liked to use a real-life situation involving debit and credit cards. Did you know that they are called debit cards because the bank owes us money whenever a deposit is made? So, whenever we withdraw the money in the card, it debits the bank's account to decrease its liability to us, and vise versa with credit cards. It was not that debit meant decrease and credit meant increase like I thought it did years before I took accounting. If you do not find that amusing, then accounting might not be the program for you. To obtain a bachelor's in accounting, it is best if you are passionate about accounting. It has to be fun doing Excel spreadsheets and consolidating financial statements if you want to be content in your long-term accounting career.

Additionally, another helpful tip to consider is improving your time management skills. Taking multiple accounting courses at once can be overwhelming if the work piles up, and it will pile up. Procrastination is the worst thing to do when majoring in accounting. It is advised that assignments should be scheduled in a chronological order of what is due first. Doing multiple assignments at the same time would affect the quality of work. Simply take a deep breath, remain calm, and complete each task one at a time. Breaks are important too. Being an accounting major might increase the probability of burning out, but if you take care of yourself and stay motivated, everything will fall into place.

Joining groups might help you improve your collaboration and communication abilities. Going on company tours might help you locate internships and jobs when you graduate. When it comes to accounting, networking is a useful tool to have. Employers are searching for more than simply qualified accountants; they also want team players who can work well with others. These are my top three advice for getting your accounting program off to a good start. I hope that my suggestions inspired you to declare accounting as your preferred field of study.
