Attention Feds:

PDT meets Office of Personnel Management (OPM) criteria for training - OPM is encouraging agencies to continue to consider professional organizations such as AGA as a source of training for their employees.

Most agencies are operating under tight budget restrictions which means you will need to strongly convey the value and benefits of attending the PDT. Here are some things to consider:

- \Rightarrow **Be Specific**. Focus on what you will bring back to your agency or organization as a return on investment.
- \Rightarrow Spread the Word. Offer to prepare and deliver a short presentation and Q&A to your colleagues when you return. That way others will get the benefits of your attendance too.
- \Rightarrow **Share** the training agenda and speaker handouts with your colleagues. As an attendee, you have unlimited access to materials posted by speakers.
- ⇒ Stress the time and money savings. If you are working to obtain or maintain your Certified Government Financial Management (CGFM) designation, remind your supervisor that you can earn up to 24 CPE hours in one place. Attending the PDT is less expensive than registering for separate conferences, and it means less time away from the office.
- ⇒ **Be prepared**. Show your supervisor a plan that indicates who will cover for you while you are away.
- \Rightarrow Check for lower rates. Be sure to check the registration page

(http://www.agacgfm.org/PDT2015/Registration.aspx) to see if you qualify for any discounts.

Meet Your Board Members Sandra J Starnes CPA, CGFM, CICA

Sandra began her accounting career in public accounting at a local CPA firm where she specialized in the audit of non-profit corporations and working with small businesses in the

development of their accounting systems. When the Internal Revenue Service first started looking at electronic filing of individual tax returns Sandra was ask to participate on a joint task force to assist the IRS in implementing this, at the time, ground breaking technology.

Over the years her interest in Governmental Accounting led to a career change and in 2002 she took a position as

the Children & Family Services Financial Manager for the Port Gamble S'Klallam Tribe in Kingston WA. Her responsibilities include overseeing several federal, state, and local grants as well as the preparation of the Tribe's Behavioral Health Clinic's financial statements.

Working closely with her federal partners Sandra has been able to assist the Tribe in becoming the first Tribal Nation in history to operate a complete social service department including TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families), foster care, child support, Elders, and youth assistance programs. She has had the privilege of serving on the Tax Exempt & Government Entities Division of the IRS representing Tribes throughout the country and has been the local coordinator for a free income tax assistance site established for the benefit of the community over the past seven years.

OPM's Discontinuation of Issuing Memoranda regarding Whether Conferences Qualify as a Training Activity under 5 CFR 410.404

Effective immediately, the U.S. Office of Personnel Management (OPM) is discontinuing its practice of issuing memoranda regarding whether conferences qualify as a training activity in accordance with 5 CFR 410.404. OPM is discontinuing this practice to make clear that agencies are responsible for their employees' training and development as provided by the statute and regulations, 5 U.S.C. chapter 41 and 5 CFR Part 410. To determine whether an agency may sponsor an employee's attendance at a conference, the applicable regulation, 5 CFR 410.404, requires agencies to make the following determination:

Determining if a Conference is a Training Activity. Agencies may sponsor an employee's attendance at a conference as a developmental assignment under section 4110 of title 5, United States Code, when—

(a) The announced purpose of the conference is educational or instructional;
(b) More than half of the time is scheduled for a planned, organized exchange of information between presenters and audience which meets the definition of training in section 4101 of title 5, United States Code;
(c) The content of the conference is germane to improving individual and/or organizational performance, and
(d) Development benefits will be derived through the employee's attendance.

When making this determination, agencies should review the conference's agenda, session descriptions and additional information, as appropriate. We encourage agencies to continue to consider professional training organizations and affinity groups as a source of training. If you have questions regarding training, you should consult with your Chief Learning Officer or Training Officer for guidance.
