## Leadership Award Nominations

Do you know of someone that might qualify to be a nominee for an AGA Leadership Award? The Nashville chapter is seeking special individuals who the Awards committee could nominate for three different National AGA awards. Those awards are Excellence in Government Leadership, William R. Snodgrass Distinguished Leadership, and the Distinguished Local Government Leadership awards.

Qualifications for these awards include government professionals who exemplify and promote excellence in government financial management, outstanding leadership, high ethical standards, and innovative management procedures. The nominees for these awards need to have served as role models for others and have consistently exhibited the highest personal and professional standards in government.

These awards vary by the type of work or level of government. For example, the William R. Snodgrass is for an individual in state government. This award is named after an individual who served the state of Tennessee as its first elected Comptroller of the Treasury. Mr. Snodgrass is known for his office's implementation of GAAP for all local governments and the start of auditing them for adherence, long before others. Under his leadership, Tennessee was the first state to receive a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting.

The Distinguished Local Government nominee comes from an individual in local government. The Excellence in Government Leadership Award is for an individual coming from either a state or local government level. Nominees do not have to be members of AGA but must be employed by the government at the time the work being recognized was performed.

The national award winner for the Excellence in Government Leadership Award for this past year was Deborah Loveless, recently retired from the Comptroller for the state of Tennessee. Congratulations to Deborah on this honor!

## Internal Control/Improper Payments

Reducing improper payments — i.e., payments made in an incorrect amount or to the wrong recipient — is critical to effectively managing taxpayer funds. To this end, the revised version of OMB Circular A-123's Appendix C (M-21-19, Requirements for Payment Integrity Improvement) released earlier this year provides an updated set of requirements focused on preventing improper payments and ensuring taxpayer money is serving its intended purpose while reducing administrative burden. To comply with this new guidance and to make continued strides in preventing and reducing improper payments, agencies must innovate and embrace new ways of addressing the improper payment challenge – from the way they perform risk assessments to the way they estimate improper payments, set improvement targets, develop mitigation strategies and corrective actions, and monitor progress. In addition, today, agencies are responsible for disbursing funds under existing programs along with funds under emergency conditions, such as those disbursed under the CARES Act and related emergency relief legislation. As a result, it is essential more than ever to continue to find new and better ways to prevent and reduce improper payments.
