What are some of the common shortcuts in Excel?



Shortcuts

- Learn the shortcuts available to your version of Excel!
 - Time-saving tips to avoid formulas
- Try to work with the ribbons in the tab
 - Using the Alt key gives you access to all the tabs in the ribbon
- Quick Access toolbar is your friend!
 - Make sure to spend the time to customize your quick access toolbar with the tools you use most to make the quickest adjustments
- Bonus Tip: Try filling with the right click button rather than the left click.



How can I see which cells are formulas and which are constants?



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Formulas Vs. Constants

- Numerous ways to do this:
 - Alt + \sim
 - Go To Special
 - Conditional Formatting



How can I see which cells are dependent on the current cell? Or vice-versa?

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Formula Auditing

- Trace Precedents to find the sources of the formula in the active cell
- Trace Dependents to identify what cells on the sheet have formulas that depend on the active cell



Data Validation

• Protect what a user can input.



How can I see what is happening on another sheet when I am working in excel?

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Viewing information on other tabs

- If you want to view a small number of cells, use a Watch Window
- If you want to view an entire sheet, use a New Window.



Why does my Vlookup return an error when I know there is a correct value?

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Lookup Functions

- VLOOKUP performs a vertical lookup of data organized in columns
- HLOOKUP performs a horizontal lookup of data organized in rows



Index and Match

- Index Returns the Value at the *x*th row and *y*th value
- Match Similar to lookup, returns the position of a selected value in a table



Why does my pivot table default to COUNT instead of SUM?



Pivot Tables

• Quickest easiest way to organize large data sets
