

The RVP's Message

In January of 2017, I started my journey of attending University of Guam's (UOG) Professional Master's in Business Administration (PMBA) Program. The PMBA is a one-year graduate degree program that is designed for mid-level and executive managers who have an undergraduate degree in business or non-business, with business core area, from an accredited university or college. It's a fast-paced program wherein the courses equivalent to almost 6 regular semesters are compressed in 1 year. There were 11 of us who participated in the 2017 batch, normally a batch in the graduate program is called a cohort. Our group is Cohort 13 and each cohort creates a team name such as Co-Great, Co-Heart, Co-Hurt and other team names. We named our team "Co-Huh?" because we were not sure what we got ourselves into and the difficulty of the tasks for each course in the PMBA program. In any professional journey, if you have the determination, patience and willingness to learn attitude, you will surpass your fears and later be confident that you can get through these challenges with pride and optimism. We finally graduated last December and there were 240 students from various majors who marched to receive their diplomas. There were 64 students out of the 240 that were under the Graduate studies of the UOG.

It is remarkable to see a lot of professionals who have finished under graduate degrees but continues to advance their education through graduate degrees and/or professional certifications. They do this for their professional growth and to be more knowledgeable and well-informed in their specific industries. They also want to find ways on how they can help in the community through their projects and special assignments.

And most of these goals and objectives are available in our AGA organization. Each chapter provides their members a path to continuing education through their training programs and general membership meetings. AGA also promotes a professional certification which is the Certified Government Financial Manager (CGFM).

Each chapter also organizes various community services throughout the program year wherein members can participate in giving back to their communities.

I would like to pass the best tip Rodlyn Gerrardo gave me to pass the CGFM. She advised me to set a date to take the test because it would force me to study. If I don't have a date set, then I would not be able to plan my study time. She was right and I passed all sections within one year. This also helped me obtain the GGFM Scholarship. Another tip I would give is, if you could correctly answer 80% or more of the quiz questions in the course guides, you can pass the test.



The Mark of Excellence in Federal, State and Local Government

Certified Government Financial Manager (CGFM) is a professional certification recognizing the unique skills and special knowledge required of today's government financial managers. It covers governmental accounting, auditing, financial reporting, internal controls and budgeting at the federal, state and local levels.

Interested in attaining the CGFM Certification?

Individuals must apply for the CGFM Program and meet the following requirements: 1) **Ethics:** Read and agree to abide by AGA's Code of Ethics; 2) **Education:** Have a bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university; 3) **Examination:** Pass three (3) comprehensive CGFM examinations; and 4) **Experience:** Have at least two (2) years of professional-level experience in government financial management.

Maintaining CGFM Certification

To retain the CGFM certification, all CGFMs must adhere to the AGA's Code of Ethics. In addition, to continue using the CGFM designation after their name, CGFMs must be in an active status.

Active Status

To maintain the CGFM certification in an active status, CGFMs are required to:

- Pay the CGFM renewal Fee by the due date every year.

- Complete at least 80 hours of Continuing Professional Education (CPE) every two years in government financial management topics or related technical subjects (within the designated two-year cycle).

- Maintain and, if requested by AGA, provide detailed information on CPE hours completed.

By submitting their annual renewal payment, CGFMs affirm that they have and will continue to abide by AGA's Code of Ethics and that they have fulfilled the minimum CPE Requirements.

Public Law 33-18 and P.L. 33-222 provides a 10% pay differential for Government of Guam employees who hold the CGFM and work for a line agency, the Office of Public Accountability, the University of Guam or Guam Department of Education. The law also provides a pay differential for Certified Internal Auditors, Fraud Examiners and CPAs.

Thirty-four participants completed the 6-day AGA Certified Government Financial Manager Review Course as instructed by Mr. John Herko from September 19 to 26, 2017. Good luck to the participants as they pursue their path to CGFM!





Ms. Pamela Young, CGFM, CPA, CGMA

Ms. Pamela Young, CGFM, CPA, CGMA, is employed at the City and County of Honolulu, heading the Accounting Section of the Department of Budget and Fiscal Services.

How did you get involved with AGA? Not too long after being hired by the City, the division chief recruited me as a member. Since I frequently attended luncheon meetings courtesy of an office carpool, he nominated me for the chapter treasurer position. Like his successors, he supported my professional development by authorizing my attendance at conferences and seminars. The National office also played an early role in my AGA involvement by offering me free registration at its annual conference held in San Francisco that year as first place winner in a community service project photo contest. (Note that the local chapter provided me with a generous stipend which covered my hotel room charge for that national conference.)

What is a benefit of the CGFM?

As a result of attaining the CGFM designation, I activated my CPA license since both require 80 continuing professional education credits biennially.

What are a couple of important challenges today in your workplace? One of the issues my section faces is the successful and smooth transition of work to the next generation as baby boomers retire. Another is keeping abreast of a rapidly changing governmental accounting and

financial reporting environment and making the necessary improvements in a timely manner.

What accomplishment are you most proud of in your career?

Implementing new governmental accounting standards and taking proactive steps for succession planning (that is, leadership development).

What advice would you give a new college graduate joining the field?

Find a mentor who will help guide you to reach your full potential, develop yourself professionally by volunteering for work assignments, view job challenges as growth opportunities, and finally envision where you would like to be at the end of your career and plan accordingly, avoiding regrets.

What is the best thing about AGA? I enjoy the multitude of opportunities AGA affords for professional and personal development, and networking with professionals in accounting and the related fields.

Currently, Ms. Young is AGA's Regional Vice President-Elect for the Pacific Rim. She served as President of the Hawaii Chapter from 2015-2016, and is currently the Chapter Chair of the Media and Luncheon Programs Committees and Co-Chair of the Chapter's 2018 Government Professional Accounting Seminar. During her tenure as Chapter President, the Hawaii Chapter received the Platinum Chapter Award and the Chapter Website Award for Group C, and her nominee was honored with the Distinguished Local Government Leadership Award.

Since becoming a member in 1988, Ms. Young has been a strong supporter of the Hawaii Chapter. She served as Treasurer during fiscal year 1992, and recruited a number of new members over the years. She could be counted on to participate in the chapter's luncheon meetings, conferences and seminars, accounting student nights and community service projects, and to document many of the chapter events and activities through photography. In fact, one of her pic-

tures was awarded first place in the 1999 national community service photo contest, capturing two past presidents cleaning the deck of the U.S.S. Missouri.

Ms. Young was elected to the Hawaii State Board of Education in 2010, and served as the Vice-Chairwoman of the Committee on Budget & Fiscal Accountability. Additionally, Ms. Young served on the steering committee for the creation of the Mililani Mauka/Launani Valley Neighborhood Board No. 35, and was elected to serve on its board from 1997 to 2010 as the Vice Chair, Treasurer, Transportation Committee Chair, and Representative to the Citizen Advisory Committee of the Oahu Metropolitan Planning Organization.

Ms. Young presently is serving within her community as the President and Social Committee Chair of the Friends of the Mililani Public Library; Second President and Historian for the Mililani Lions Club; and Co-Chair of the Patsy T. Mink Central Oahu Regional Park Advisory Committee, a position she held since 1999.

Since becoming a steward and delegate in 1998 for the Hawaii Government Employees Association, Ms. Young assumed various leadership roles. For the Professional and Scientific Unit, she served as Oahu Island Division Chair, Director and President, culminating in her election for two terms from 2013 to 2017 as a Director of the corporation.

Her other professional memberships include the Hawaii Society of Certified Public Accountants and the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants.
