INTRODUCTION

INTRODUCTION

NOVAGA is an association with approximately 800 members from the federal, state, public and private practices, with a mission statement to serve professionals in the government financial management community by providing quality education, fostering professional development and certification and supporting standards and research to advance government accountability.

AGA National

The Association of Government Accountants published "The First Twenty-Five Years of the Federal Government Accountants Association" in 1975. It contained some excellent research, and describes AGA's founding in the following words:

The source of the idea to organize what became the Federal Government Accountants Association (FGAA) is somewhat clouded. Some believe that it was in a most informal but select organization, now called the "Accounting Forum," but in 1950 better known as the "Round Table Group." Others are of the opinion that the idea originated with a group of CPAs--employees of the Government and members of the District of Columbia Institute of Certified Public Accountants, who were dissatisfied with the Institute's emphasis on the activities of its members engaged in public accounting almost to the exclusion of attention to the work of its members identified with Federal agencies. There is probably merit to both views, for at that time the D.C. Institute geared its programs almost entirely to the interests of public accounting practitioners, while the Round Table Group-whose meetings were held around a circular table that could seat only twenty-two persons, and whose members included the most prestigious Federal accountants--took pride in its exclusiveness. There is no doubt, however, that the one to light the fuse that started the fire for the Federal Government Accountants Association was Robert W. King. An active participant in professional accounting societies, he benefited from the experience of his friends and of himself in such organizations to be the guiding force for the creation of FGAA.

Upon the invitation of Mr. King, twenty-one Federal accountants with top accounting positions attended a luncheon on May 12, 1950, to discuss the need for an organization of accountants in the employ of Federal Government agencies. It being agreed at this meeting that such an organization should be formed, Mr. King was elected chairman of a working committee to develop plans for the "Federal Accountants Association." The first meeting of this committee was on June 6, 1950, at his home, where subcommittees were appointed to analyze the various matters to be considered in forming the new organization.

At another luncheon meeting on July 12, 1950, the fifty Federal accountants in attendance agreed to go forward with the organization of the Federal Government Accountants Association. At the official organizational meeting at the old Raleigh Hotel on September 14, 1950, by-laws were adopted and officers elected. The first fifty-nine membership certificates were issued as of that date, their recipients being designated as charter members. See Appendix 1 for a list of the charter members and original officers.

The Association was incorporated in the District of Columbia on April 27, 1951. Outlined in its certificate of incorporation, a copy of which is in Appendix 9, are its four initial objectives which, during the first quarter century of its life, have constituted the essential motivation of its operation:

- to unite professional accountants for constructive endeavors;
- to encourage and provide a means for free interchange of ideas
- to aid in the improvement of accounting and auditing; and
- to contribute to the improvement of education.

The early membership of the Association included only uppergrade Federal employees with accounting responsibilities. Gradually, admission rules were liberalized to admit—in some cases on a limited basis—individuals with appropriate professional qualifications or interests, who were not Federal employees. As early as 1963, it was proposed that the doors be opened wide to state and local finance officers, but it was not until February 1972, that the by-laws were amended to give effect to this proposal. Recognition of this broadened membership base culminated in changing the name of the Association, toward the end of its twenty-fifth year, to "Association of Government Accountants," the change to be effective as of July 1, 1975. In February 1975, a revision of the by-laws was authorized. As amended, they have been published as of July 1, 1975, as the By-laws of the Association of Government Accountants.

In the amended by-laws, the four objectives stated above are retained but as applicable to financial management and its professional practitioners rather than to accounting and accountants and auditors. Two additional objectives are included:

- to enhance the professional image of financial managers and management in government service; and
- to encourage expansion and improvement of service to the public.

In a generation, the "Federal Government Accountants Association" has become a mature, strong and vigorous organization, inspired by a vision that has led to a change in name to "Association of Government Accountants," to identify it with the breadth of its activities, now and in the future.

In the middle of the 1960s, the Metropolitan Washington Area experienced a phenomenal population growth in the surrounding suburban areas. A number of visionaries observing this growth saw the need for a local Northern Virginia Chapter that would afford members greater opportunities for involvement in FGM affairs. The Chapter with 70 original members largely from the Defense audit agencies, was chartered by the National Association in the latter part of 1968.

The founding fathers' perception proved correct. Under the direction of Joseph Welsch, the Chapter's first president, the membership roster by the end of June 1969 had grown to 208. A total of 29 different organizations were represented and the Chapter received national awards both for the largest percentage increase in new members and the greatest net increase in new members.

Through the combination of excellent program speakers, congenial meeting places and the opportunity for membership involvement, the Chapter continued to grow and attract new members in its second and third years. Under Don Scantlebury and Chuck Garrett, respectively, this period saw the Chapter jointly sponsor educational seminars and promote the profession. Members visited local schools and spoke on a local radio station on the satisfactions inherent in a career in accounting and financial management. A Chapter research project was also initiated which won the National Research Competition in Fiscal Year 1972. This research project resulted in a compendium of articles of which over 3,000 copies have been distributed to interested individuals and organizations.

In the succeeding years, past presidents Bill Crouch, Gretchen Schwarz, Fred Heim, and John Carroll have continued to build on previous accomplishments. In 1972, the Chapter began the practice of having an annual joint meeting with the Northern Virginia Chapter of CPAs. These meetings have proven to be professionally enriching to both groups and are a program highlight each year. Emphasis has continued to be placed on the educational interests of Chapter members. Seminars have been held-either by the Chapter or jointly with sister chapters--on such topics as Management by Objectives, The Government Manager, A Strategy for Success in Managing Resources, Operational - Performance - Program - Management Auditing, and the Budget and Impoundment Control Act of 1974. Attendance at these seminars has been high and reflects interest of the membership.

Another reflection of the member interest is evident in the Chapter's having received the 1974 Membership Retention Award for chapters in our size grouping Two members of the Chapter have received National Distinguished Leadership Awards--William Petty in 1969 and Bernard B. Lynn in 1972--and many others have accepted positions at the Association's national level. The Chapter's accomplishments have been great and it looks forward to the future with confidence.

THE PROGRAM YEARS

Chapter 1 1968—1969

To show you just how small the world is, former NOVAGA President John Laney (2001-2002) writes of Mr. Welsch:

"He worked with my father in OSD Audit. I knew him and he came over to the house for dinner when I was 9 years old in Albuquerque. Played ping pong with him when he came to dinner. I remember he sent a letter thanking me for the game. He transferred my father from Kirtland AFB in Albuquerque to Washington D.C. to work in the D.C. office of OSD Audit. I have good memories of Mr. Welsch. He was very much admired by his colleagues for his work."

Mr. Welsch went on to the Department of Transportation.

In 2004 when we contacted Past Presidents, Mr. Welsch had moved to New Jersey.

In 2008, we tracked Mr. Welsch to Florida.

Chapter 2 1969—1970

Vital Statistics

President Donald L. Scantlebury, GAO

According to The Federal Accountant, Volume XIX, No. 1, March 1970, and updated by his daughter, Don Scantlebury, was manager of the Washington Regional Office of the U.S. General Accounting Office (now Government Accountability Office). At the time of his chapter presidency, he had 13 years of service with GAO in various capacities. Prior to joining GAO, he was employed in public accounting for several years. Mr. Scantlebury is a CPA (Iowa and Wisconsin) and member of the AICPA, as well as the Federal Government Accountants Association (FGAA) (now AGA).

Mr. Scantlebury was very active in a local and national level. He authored several articles for The Federal Accountant, including such topics as:

- Reporting Audit Findings, March 1970
- Future Directions in Government Accounting, December 1975, co-authored with Ronell B. Raum

He also co-authored Operational Auditing with Ronell B. Raaum.

By 1975, he was director of the Financial and General Management Studies Division at GAO.

His daughter updated us that he was GAO's first Chief Accountant, and represented GAO at meetings of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (pre-FASAB). He also served as the Chairman of the JFMIP Steering Committee and there is an annual memorial award given in his honor. Mr. Scantlebury went on to become AGA National President for Fiscal Year 1977. Here is a copy of his message to the membership that year:


I am very pleased to accept the presidency of the Association of Government Accountants for the fiscal year 1977 and wish to gratefully acknowledge the high honor the Association has bestowed upon me. I would like to assure all of you here that I will do my utmost to continue the effective leadership you have enjoyed under my distinguished predecessors.

The Association of Government Accountants is a lively, growing organization with a very able staff and a membership comprised of the finest government accountants and auditors in the country. During the past year we have added four new chapters and have increased our membership by nearly 300. Moreover, we have done a great deal for which we can be proud. We have disseminated information on current matters of concern through a top notch technical journal. We have a first rate course on operational auditing which many have taken and we have done other work in helping our members improve their professional skills. The work we have done in training minority business people in accounting techniques under the OMBE program is indeed a bright spot in the Association's activities. Few, if any, others have done so well in meeting this need.

Despite what we have done, I think we have before us the greatest challenge we have ever had. Many of our cities and some of our States face overwhelming financial problems. They are unable to pay bills on time, their accounting systems do not give them prompt reliable information on where they stand financially and they are unable to give employees promised salary increases. Furthermore, the Federal Government has been running up record deficits and many of its agencies are plagued with problems in getting vitally needed financial information. There are also concerns with whether programs like social security and our federal pension system will be able to stand the financial strain when the percentage of retirees to total population increases substantially as it is predicted to do in the future.

Because of all these pressing problems in our area of concern—Government finances—I believe we should dedicate this year to service. To helping our Federal, State and city Governments get better control over their financial activities. Toward this end, I have chosen as the theme for the Association of Government Accountants for 1977—Serving Government More Effectively. I challenge each chapter and each member of AGA not only to do his best for the Government he serves but also to undertake projects that will move us forward in this endeavor.

For myself, I pledge to you my best efforts during this year to see that the Association moves forward and that the National Committees will pursue our theme energetically.



Life after AGA

Fred retired in 1985 (the first time!) and went on to work at the United Nations as the Director of Financial Funds and Agriculture in Rome, Italy, where he worked until 1992. He continued on as the Director of Financial Administration for the US Export Council for Renewable Energy, which the Clinton Administration subsequently disbanded.

In 1999 he went to work for the Smithsonian Institution, where he was in charge of A-133 (Single Audit Act) audits. He also helped set indirect rate costs with the Office of Naval Research, who developed a space vehicle in connection with NASA and Harvard University through the Smithsonian. He retired from the Smithsonian in September 2004.

In 2009 Fred and Janet were living in Springfield, Virginia. They were getting ready to sell the house, packing and moving their belongings to storage. They retired to Deland, Florida.

Chapter Activities

In the April 1984 NOVAGA News & Views, NOVAGA Charter Member Stan Haddock and Chapter Historian writes:

I found that Frank Sato was our president, and under his leadership our chapter played a large part in the success of the 1976 AGA National Symposium which was held in Philadelphia. While we had 48 registered attendees, we also had considerable participation in all facets of the program. Four of our members were involved with Symposium Committee tasks for a number of months: Jim (DCAA) Brown (publicity), Dick Nygaard (workshops), Larry Olewine (programs), and Don Whitford (finance). We also had a number of participants who shared their talents, expertise and experience by conducting various parts of the program:

Don Scantlebury, Plenary Session Panelist Bernie Lynn, Plenary Session Moderator Frank Sato, Presiding Officer, AGA Honors Herb Garland, Workshop Panelist Bobby Oakley, Workshop Moderator Larry Olewine, Workshop Moderator Fred Heim, Bill De Moyne and Max Minkin were active in manning the Audit Compendium Sales table, while Jack Fawsett and Chuck Woehrle assisted at the late registration desk.

In addition, we took a goodly share of the AGA Awards - Joe Welsch received the Distinguished Leadership Award and Gordon Harvey was honored with the Author's Award. Also, our chapter took second place in the Chapter Competition Program. The Symposium was successful on all fronts, and those listed above made significant contributions to the sharing of knowledge and knowhow.

Life After NOVAGA

When he was NOVAGA president, he was serving as the Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense (Audit) in the Department of Defense, a position he held from October 1974 to May 1979. In addition, from March 1977 to May 1979 he also concurrently held the position as the first Director, Defense Audit Service.

According to the Government Accountants Journal, he went on to serve as the Inspector General of the Department of Transportation (DOT) from May 1979 to January 1981. On July 31, 1981, Frank S. Sato was appointed Inspector General, Veterans Administration by President Reagan, after confirmation by the U.S. Senate.

Over his career, he was associated with the U.S. Air Force Auditor General and the Office of the Secretary of Defense for 25 years. He is also a member of the AICPA, the Virginia Society of CPAs, the Association of Federal Investigators, and the National Association of Asian American CPAs, as well as numerous other federal and civic associations.

Mr. Sato wrote at least one article for the Government Accountants Journal:

• Financial Statements Help Promote Efficiency and Effectiveness in Government, Summer 1985

He also served as AGA National President (1979-80). Mr. Sato received the Association of Government Accountants Distinguished Leadership Award in 1978, the Department of Defense Distinguished Civilian Service Award in 1979, and the Association of Government Accountants Gold Medal Award in 1981. He continued to serve AGA after his retirement, serving on the Publications Committee of The Government Accountants Journal in 1994.

Mr. Sato currently resides in Washington State and is an At-Large AGA Member. He emailed us to thank us for the kind invitation to our 2009 Awards Banquet, but was unable to attend.

Effectiveness Evaluations, Volume XXIV, No. 4, December 1975, which drew from his experience as Associate Director for Audit and Organizational Analysis, AAA.

In the February 1985 NOVAGA News & Views, NOVAGA charter member Stan Haddock writes:

In reviewing past events, I found that "professional development and communications" seemed to be the key words for the 1979-1980 year. Jack Fawsett was our president and planned the activities during the year. Three seminars were held on:

- 1. Improving interpersonal relations between managers and staff level accountants and auditors.
- 2. Cost accounting standards issues.
- 3. Quantitative techniques in operational auditing.

The theme for 8 dinner meetings was "Fraud in Government Programs: Is There a Solution?" In addition, thanks to the efforts of our president, Jack Fawsett and our OMBE Conductors, Frank May, a new 12-week basic course in Accounting and Financial Management for Minority Business Persons was begun. In addition, our chapter completed a video tape which gave an overview of the OMBE basic course. Our chapter held its first ever Fall Dinner Theater outing at the Lazy Susan Dinner Theater with 47 NOVAGA members attending. **Hal Stugart** was credited for the enjoyable evening.

Attendees at our monthly meetings reached new records (over 135 at one meeting). The seminars were a great success and membership increased to over 700. The monthly newsletter became a hallmark for other chapters to achieve. When Jim Brown took over for Jack in the following year he asked "How did

President Harold L. Stugart, CPA, Army Audit Agency

Harold (Hal) Stugart went on to serve as AGA National President in 1985. In the Spring 1985 Government Accountants Journal, Hal wrote:

> AGA's publications policy provides that individual issues of this journal may be built around a theme of current interest when adequate material is available, and I believe that GAO's recent issuance of a revised title 2 of its *Policies and Procedures Manual for the Guidance of Federal Agencies* provides an excellent opportunity for us to publish such a theme issue.

> Title 2 now contains significant new requirements for summary-level financial statements for the government as a whole, as well as at department and agency and lower levels. Its drafters feel that it will facilitate an independent audit, and that the process of compiling statements through consistent application and enforcement of specifically defined standards will provide a discipline that is reinforced when the process is repeated annually. All financial managers in government should be aware of this impact.

> As is the case with any new concept, there are elements of controversy surrounding the new title 2. I feel it is the privilege, as well as the responsibility, of each AGA member to join the informed discussion of these points, and to assist in their resolution. In doing so, we achieve perhaps the most lofty reason for our existence as a professional body.

> We are extremely fortunate to have United States Comptroller General Charles A. Bowsher as a "keynoter" for this issue. Mr. Bowsher, whose General Accounting Office (GAO) promulgated title 2, is naturally in strong support of the key element of title 2, summary financial statements at all levels of government.

> Mr. Bowsher points to two of the most significant events in financial management lore as prime examples of what can happen when financial statements contain little, if any, reliable information. The earlier event, in the private sector, was the stock market crash in 1929; at that time, many companies were providing investors unaudited financial statements that supported stock values that management desired. The crash led to the establishment of the SEC and resulting close regulation of reporting and auditing activity.

The other event, in the public sector, was the severe financial crisis in New York City and New York State in 1975, when the financial markets declined to purchase the securities of these governments because the two entities did not have good pictures of their own financial conditions. Neither city officials nor professional accountants could reconcile the cash accounts, or determine the amount of debt, or make sense of any of the numbers. All this led to much more attention being paid to accounting standards for state and local governments, and the eventual establishment of the Government Accounting Standards.

While neither of these crises may have been prevented by the summary level statements described in title 2, these statements together with strict standards and disciplined accounting systems surely would have sounded an alarm of impending danger, Mr. Bowsher says. He expands his case in describing the advantages of the concepts advanced in title 2, and how these concepts apply to today's circumstances.

In a follow-on article, Jerry Murphy identifies 1984 as a memorable year in Federal financial management. Three major government initiatives, he says, moved "in harmony, if not in concert," to make the year memorable. These were the issuance of revisions to GAO's title 2, the release of OMB's Circular A-127, and the development by the Treasury Department of a conceptual design for a new Central Financial Management System (CFMS). Mr. Murphy goes on to describe fully the rationale and workings of the CFMS, and how it ties in to the other initiatives.

John Lordan next tells of the significant actions OMB has taken to "put the M back into OMB," or to improve the way government does business, through such well-known initiatives as the emphasis on internal controls, cash management, audit follow-up programs, financial systems reforms, etc. At the same time, he cautions that summary-level financial reporting, or the revamping thereof, is not a cure-all. The current attention to this topic, he says, is warranted, timely and potentially constructive. "But one should guard against overstating the role of historical financial reports in macroeconomic decision making or in 'managing' the cost of government," he continues. Rather, he maintains, most spending choices will be made from political considerations and not through improved bookkeeping or financial reporting. Priority attention should be given to more contemporary problems, he argues.

Following these three articles by representatives of three of the principal agencies in the Joint Financial Management Improvement Program (JFMIP), other authors expand the scope of this close examination of the new title 2. It is further planned that the ensuing issue of this journal will carry an article on auditing Federal agency financial statements, by GAO's Fred Wolf, plus pieces carrying Federal agency opinions of title 2, by authors from within those agencies. I commend all this to your close familiarization.

Finally, I would like to express our appreciation to Bruce Michelson, of the General Accounting Office, for his assistance in gathering much of the material and manuscripts which appear in this theme issue.

President Michael A. Janoski, CIA, CPA, CFE Army Audit Agency

At the time of his Presidency, Mike was Deputy Auditor General of the Army. As a certified member of the Senior Executive Service and occupying the second highest professional auditor position in the U.S. Army, he functioned as Chief of Audit Operations directing the activity of nearly 750 auditors in over 40 duty stations throughout the world.

Mike holds a Bachelor of Science in Commerce from DePaul University and a Master of Arts in Public Administration from Oklahoma University.

His accomplishments at AAA during this time included establishing a Developmental Assignment Program to facilitate the broadening of individual experiences by providing challenging temporary assignments to auditors who were not able to permanently relocate. Over 100 auditors participated in the program. He issued audit reports indentifying potential monetary benefits to the Army averaging \$696 million annually. These accomplishments were recognized by Commander's Award for Civilian Service.

This period of time began the introduction of microcomputers into our world, and Mike was on the forefront of that effort, a theme you will see he sought to impart onto his fellow NOVAGA members. At AAA, Mike went on to become the Director for Acquisition and Systems Audits at AAA, where he provided direction to 230 auditors conducting audits in acquisition, research and development, and automation areas within the Department of the Army. In this position, he was responsible for audits that identified potential monetary benefits exceeding \$2.6 billion. He effectively dealt with key managers of the Department of Defense and external audit and inspection groups in minimizing the potential for duplication of efforts. His accomplishments were recognized by receipt of the prestigious Presidential Meritorious Rank Award.

AAA Involvement

During 1984, many other Army Auditors held prominent roles in AGA, to include the following personnel on the Publications Policy Board of The Government Accountants Journal: **Charles A. (Tony) Arigo, Patrick E. Daly, Francis E. (Gene) Reardon** (Chairman – who would become NOVAGA's 24th President in 1991), and **G. Bradford Snead**. Also on the Board was HEW's **James B. Durnil** (who would become next year's NOVAGA President).

Resurrecting the Chapter

Mike was the president of NOVAGA for 1 ½ years. The prior president (Wil Campbell) was reassigned by GAO to its Norfolk VA office early in 1984. Mike provided us Newsletters of his presidency, which you can read on our Web site, <u>www.novaga.org</u>, under History Project. Mike writes:

The chapter was going through a hard time with limited attendance at its monthly meetings and a cash balance that barely supported the publication of the newsletter. Therefore, my emphasis the first year was on raising attendance and getting solvent. A combination of techniques was

employed. I knew that if the leaders came, followers would fill the room. I therefore contacted the heads of the major audit organizations in town and got attendance commitments from - **Mr. Welsch** (DOT IG)[and first NOVAGA President], **Mr. Kusserow** (HHS IG), **Mr. Stugart** (AAA) [and 14th NOVAGA President as well as Army Auditor General, & National President Elect , **Mr. Starrett** (DCM)[Director DCAA], and **Mr. Uyeda** (Executive Director JFMIP & AGA President). Next, we focused on generating educational seminars that were timely and pertinent and identifying speakers for our meetings that people wanted to hear. The desired results were obtained. For example:



- A March 1984 educational seminar on Methods Utilized in the Audit of Computer Systems in the Federal Government drew 124 people while 220 people attended the evening dinner meeting to hear Senator John Warner comm
 - 220 people attended the evening dinner meeting to hear **Senator John Warner** comment on a variety of subjects.
- An October 1984 educational seminar on New Applications and Software for Microcomputers drew 124 people. Top speakers such as Fred Heim [NOVAGA President 73-74 and AGA National President 82-83], Chuck Starrett, Fred Wolf, Frank Sato [NOVAGA President 76-77 and AGA National President 79-80], and Hal Stugart [NOVAGA President 81-82 and AGA National President 84-85] were brought in to build up attendance.
- The last three meetings of calendar year 1984 drew 350 people.
- A recruiting drive brought overall NOVAGA membership to over 800 and the chapter became solvent with over \$20,000 in the bank.

The second year of my term turned out to be one of fine tuning the well-oiled machine. I cut the number of directors from 16 to 11 by consolidating some responsibilities. I did establish a new Advisory Committee/Special Activities body to provide advice and counsel to the rest of the Board based on many years of experience in AGA activities. Early in 1985, I also started predinner meeting discussions or mini-seminars on various subjects to provide some free education to our members.

The Chapter also decided that **Jack Fawsett** [NOVAGA President 79-80] should be the next AGA National President rather than the individual selected by the National Office. I became Jack's campaign manager and solicited enough support from other chapters to get him on the ballot as a write-in candidate. In the subsequent election, Jack won every AGA chapter but one and proved to be an excellent National President. In retrospect, I'm most proud of that accomplishment during my tenure as NOVAGA President.

After Jack became the AGA President [1986-87], I was selected to be a member of the National Executive Committee. The only memory that sticks out was the political nature of that body and the major emphasis placed on hiring a new Executive Vice President at the National Office - a job that could have been executed less politically.

I remained active with NOVAGA for a few more years after my presidency serving on the Advisory Board. In January 1987, I authored an Advisory Group Report on Chapter Cash Requirements, Scholarship Commitments and Membership Benefits. [Read it at <u>www.novaga.org</u> under History Project]

The Government in 1984

The Intergovernmental Audit Forum – an article appeared in the April 1984 NOVAGA News & Views that discusses the history of this body.

Based on numerous discussions in the early 1970's on the need for better communication, coordination and cooperation among Federal, State and local government audit organizations, in September 1972, several State auditors and representatives of the Council of State Governments met with officials from GAO and OMB to propose establishing national and regional audit forums where problems of mutual concern to auditors of all three levels of government could be discussed. The proposal was received favorably by Federal officials and Comptroller General Elmer Staats agreed to provide leadership in the creation of the National and ten Regional Intergovernmental Audit Forums - a regional forum for each of the 10 standard Federal Regions. It was still considered viable by Comptroller General Charles A. Bowsher in 1984.

The National and ten regional Intergovernmental Audit Forums held their 5th Joint Biennial Conference of Audit Executives at the Sheraton Centre Hotel in New York City from May 6-9, 1984. The theme of the conference was "Improving Governmental Auditing Through Cooperation." The program emphasized an intergovernmental perspective in the sharing of audit experiences on the basis of the current state-of-the-art. The three day meeting had 3 plenary sessions, 5 technical audit tracks, an evening banquet, and several interesting spousal activities. Mayor Edward Koch and Harrison Goldin (Comptroller, City of New York) were 2 of the keynote and luncheon speakers. Mr. Frank Fee, Assistant Comptroller General for Operations, U.S. General Accounting Office and Mr. James Dolan, State Auditor, State of New Jersey were also keynote/luncheon speakers.

Microcomputers Now at USAAA. Do you remember these days? Mary T. Cress authored this article in May 1984:

The U.S. Army Audit Agency entered the age of microcomputer auditing with the arrival of four grid microcomputer systems in February 1984. The microcomputers were used to facilitate a special financial review requested by the Department of Justice. Two auditors and the computer specialist from the agency's Southwestern Region and an auditor from headquarters met in San Antonio, TX for 4 days of training and familiarization with the grids. Two of the people had attended formal grid training and assisted the others in learning how to set up and run the grid and its related peripheral equipment. During this first week each grid system (consisting of a compass computer, hard disk drive, portable floppy disk drive and an Epson printer) was set up in the morning and used extensively during the day.

A draft worksheet to collect the requested financial data had been created in headquarters and brought to San Antonio where it was finalized during this period. After the first week, three of the grid systems wert taken to Edgewood Arsenal, MD, Vicksburg, MI, and Denver, CO. The fourth system remained at the audit control point in San Antonio. Using the finalized worksheet as a model, financial data was entered regarding specified time periods and activities at each of the sites. The next week audit personnel and equipment from each of the sites reconvened in San Antonio where the results of the review were consolidated and stored on floppy disks. Approximately 150 worksheets capturing data covering 13 commands and government entities, 13 fiscal periods and 4 Army appropriations were created. The worksheets were manipulated to summarize costs for each of the 13 commands and government entities.

Communications were established via telephone lines between headquarters and San Antonio on a grid-lo-grid basis and a complete copy of the draft report was transmitted to headquarters. Members of the audit team estimated that 175 auditor days were saved in the collection and summarization of data and over 9 administrative days for typing and retyping were saved by using grid generated printouts of the worksheets. Based on the results of this first use, the agency is experiencing a significant demand for microcomputers for use in other audits.

Audit Milestones and Related Time Goals. This is a great 2-part article, including keys to Audit Time Control. If you're groaning because you're expected to do an audit in 6 months – or even in 165 days – read this series of articles by Jim Durnil in the October & November 1984 newsletters. It proposes a schedule and timeline for an audit lasting 4 months and 250 staff days!

The Single Audit Act Legislation and Attachment P to OMB Circular A-102. The long awaited "Single Audit Act" (S151O) passed both the House and Senate and was signed into law by the President on October 19, 1984. S1510 provides a statutory basis for the type of single audit prescribed by Attachment P to OMB Circular A102 and, it is believed by many in the audit community, should provide the needed impetus for a more rapid shift to single audit. The legislation applies to any state or local government with respect to any of its fiscal year beginning after December 31,1984. A summary of key difference between S1510 and Attachment P is in the November 1984 NOVAGA News & Views at <u>www.novaga.org</u> under History Project.

NOVAGA Representation on the FMSB. Our chapter is well represented on the AGA National board responsible for reviewing proposals of the FASB, GASB, AICPA, etc., and preparing comments on behalf of AGA. The Financial Management Standards Board has 12 members, 5 of whom are members of NOVAGA: Fred Newton of DCAA is the chairman and is accompanied by Frank Alston of Price Waterhouse. Tom McCarty of OASD (Comptroller), Bob Oakley of VA and Carol Payne of Fairfax County Public Schools.

Life After AGA

In 1989, Mike earned his CPA, retired from AAA, and became the Director of Audit Operations/ Managing Auditor at Irving Burton Associates, Inc, where he supervised activities of a core group of 50 auditors providing government clients with audit review and evaluation-type services. Here he developed an audit plan for and personally executed a series of audits of the Superconducting Super Collider--a multibillion dollar Energy Department (DOE) project. Audits of this highly visible project entailed briefings to the Secretary of Energy as well as members of Congress. He also developed and applied an approach for reviewing "front-end" controls over another major DOE project - the International Thermonuclear Experimental Reactor. He developed generic guidelines for auditing mission-oriented activities at DOE laboratories, which were adopted throughout that Agency's Inspector General audit operations. He also oversaw development of an Audit Manual addressing quality control of financial and financial-related audits. He also became a CFE in 1990.

In 1994, Mike moved to KPMG Peat Marwick, where he served as Managing Auditor/Consultant until 2001. He directed and coordinated the efforts of a 12-member Investigative Process Improvement Team that developed a reorganization plan and policies and procedures manual for the DOE Office of Investigations. He also assisted the DOE's Office of Inspector General (OIG) in its implementation of the Government Management Reform Act of 1994, which required audit of the Department's consolidated financial statements. He developed the initial Strategic Plan and performed risk assessments, forming the basis of the approach adopted for auditing the Department's consolidated financial statements. He prepared a number of subsequent annual Strategic Plans as well as publications identifying "best practices" dealing with: Management Representations, Presentation of Performance Measures in the Financial Statements, and Financial Statement Disclosures. He designed a local report format to be used in reporting on local issues identified during the audit of consolidated financial statements. He evaluated the organization and content of OIG performance audit reports and proposed a redesigned audit report format which was approved by the Deputy Inspector General for Audit Services for adoption throughout the OIG. He then provided assistance in updating the OIG Audit Manual updating specific chapters and directing the development of the entire product. He provided technical assistance for a complex performance audit of the Management of Tank Waste Remediation at the Hanford Site. At an estimated cost of nearly \$50 billion, the Hanford tank waste program is one of the largest, most technologically challenging environmental remediation efforts ever undertaken. The resulting audit report identified significant managerial shortcomings. The hard-hitting product was nevertheless well received by management and was considered an outstanding product by OIG management both from the point of view of its content as well as its timeliness.

In 2001, Mike briefly retired to concentrate on senior softball every Tuesday and Thursday mornings starting in April and extending through October with golf a ritual every Wednesday. In 2003, the Public Company Accounting Oversight Board (PCAOB), a product of the Sarbanes-

Oxley Act, decided they needed an Internal Audit staff and established a small group of 5 people headed by the former General Counsel from the DOE OIG. After they had been in operation about 2 years, I was asked to come in to critique their operation and make necessary changes to assure that they passed an upcoming external peer review. He has been working under a consulting contract with them ever since with the proviso that it does not interfere with his softball and golf!

Mike was able to attend the 2004 Awards Banquet with his wife Dorothy. Along with all of Mike's other accomplishments, we consider their successful raising of eight grown children a noteworthy accomplishment!



The Chapter education program was excellent. I think Jim Durnil coined the terms mini- and maxieducational seminar for the Chapter. Educational meetings/classes usually attracted 100 - 150 people. AGA National's chapter competition program served as the impetus driving chapter educational activities. NOVAGA consistently won or finished in the top 5 in the AGA competition.

 What types of community service events did the chapter do? We've noticed MS Walk participation for many years – did you all participate and do you know when that started?

Steve recalls that NOVAGA started to participate in MS Walk in 1986, a year before he became the President. Andrea Walker, HHS IG initiated and coordinated the effort for NOVAGA. We also participated each year in the VITA program. (Volunteers in Tax Assistance).

• What types of social or outreach programs did you do?

NOVAGA issued newsletters.

• Did you have a focus on Early Careers – our youngest/newest members, and if so, what types of activities did you do to promote Early Career involvement?

NOVAGA annually provided a couple of \$1,000 or \$2,000 scholarships as part of the NOVAGA Early Career initiative. Additionally, NOVAGA each year would have an Early Career focused meeting where we invited Accounting professors and students from local universities such as Mary Mount and George Mason. Scholarship winners were honored at these meetings.

o What accomplishment are you the most proud of during your tenure as NOVAGA President?

NOVAGA was financially well off during his presidency and the years preceding and after his tenure.

We were also lucky enough to locate an April 1988 issue of NOVAGA News and Views, in which NOVAGA President Steven Switzer said:

Our March Educational Seminar and meeting were a success due to the efforts of Fred Wolf and Janet Smith. I want to extend my thanks and appreciation to them for their efforts in developing and presenting the Seminar. *Ninety-seven* individuals attended and enjoyed an informative discussion on initiatives promoting the use of computers in auditing. The speakers did an excellent job in making their presentations.

The April meeting will be just as enjoyable if not more so. June Brown, Inspector General, DoD, will be speaking on public and private sector perspectives concerning financial management. This is another in our series of programs designed to present topics of concern and interest in the audit community. Please plan to attend; you won't regret it.

Another event you won't want to miss is the May meeting. Ron Johnson is finalizing plans for the meeting and he promises that it will be one you won't forget. We will be honoring several colleagues who have distinguished themselves through professional achievement or special service. Also, because it is our 20th Anniversary the meeting will be even more special. Be sure to mark your calendar now for Tuesday, May 17.

One last note. April and May are a transition period in Chapter activities as the current Executive Group prepares to turn over their duties and responsibilities to next year's Executive Group. Also, after the May meeting, the next meeting will be held in September. However, this does not mean that Chapter activities cease over the summer months. Your help is still needed during this period. One of the problems that continues-to-plague the Chapter is membership. You can help by convincing inactive members to pay their dues and by sponsoring new members. Serving the Chapter takes some time and effort but is a rewarding experience. Please think about it.



Tom served as deputy inspector general for audit services in the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Office of Inspector General since 1986 until his retirement in 2002. As the head of the executive branch's largest audit operation, Tom helped to save and recover billions of dollars in public assets. Under his command, 700 auditors were responsible for providing comprehensive audit

services for more than 300 HHS programs, including Medicare and Medicaid. His career began in 1963 at the US General Accounting Office, where he served until his 1970 move to HHS.

Meetings

During his presidency between 1990 and 1991, NOVAGA held monthly dinner meetings at Sheraton National Hotel at Columbia Pike and Washington Blvd, in Arlington, VA. The dinner and program took place between 6:30 pm and 9:00 pm on Tuesday or Wednesday every month. The dinner menu for the meeting on Tuesday, September 18, 1990 included Fresh Fruit in a Pineapple Boat, Prime Rib of Beef, Double Stuffed Baked Potato, Broccoli Polanaise, and Chocolate Layer Cake! In addition to the dinner, a cash bar was open at 5:30 pm.

In the President's Message of the September 1990 NOVAGA Newsletter, Tom said that "We will again be offering a series of minieducational events. These events will be offered 4 times this year, for 2 hours prior to regularly scheduled dinner meetings. A total of 8 CPE credits can be obtained by attending these 4 sessions. The sessions are free – not bad in what looks like a tight budget year coming up. Our October educational event on 'Designing Audit Steps to Detect Illegal Acts' is beginning to shape up." The newsletter also provided a new meeting policy: "this year, the cost for dinner meetings will be \$14.00 if reservations are made by noon on the preceding Friday, otherwise it will be \$18.00. Previously, the cost was \$14.00 with the address label from the newsletter. We hope this will improve service by allowing us to better plan how many meals are needed at each meeting."

Tom also stated in the newsletter, "The three qualities that have made this Chapter successful are the commitment, leadership and participation of its members. In this regard, the new Executive Board and I look forward to another exciting educational and social program. If you have not been attending our monthly meetings and educational events, I invite you to do so."

Life After NOVAGA

During 1998-1999, Tom went on to serve as AGA National President. The January 1997 AGA National Newsletter, TOPICS introduced Tom as President-Elect.

"The committee has chosen Thomas D. Roslewicz, CGFM, for the position of President-Elect. He is a member of AGA's Northern Virginia Chapter in the Capital Region. Mr. Roslewicz is the Deputy Inspector General for Audit Services at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. He is currently a member of the Association's National Executive Committee (NEC) and has served, among other positions, as president of the Northern Virginia Chapter in 1990-91, and as chairman of the 1996 Professional Development Conference and Exposition in Little Rock. He was the recipient of the Association's Frank Greathouse Distinguished Leadership Award in 1993 and has received Distinguished Leadership Awards from the Northern Virginia and Montgomery/Price George's Chapters."

The AGA National Letter issued on August 11, 1998 described Tom as AGA National President:

"With an accomplished career that began at the U.S. General

Accounting Office in 1963, AGA's 1998-99 National President, Thomas D. Roslewicz, CGFM, CPA, is ready to begin a strategic plan of action for his term. As the Deputy Inspector General for Audit Services at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), Mr. Roslewicz has chosen the theme, "**Dare to Be Bold**," as the foundation for his term as AGA President.

A Lifetime of Government Service

After 39 years of daring to be hold on behalf of the American people, Tom retired in May 2002 from his post as the Deputy Inspector General for Audit Services at HHS. The June/July 2002

AGA National Newsletter, TOPICS announced his retirement in the "AGA Members in the News" section along with the following list as Tom's accomplishments of his long career:

- Building the most professional audit organization in the federal government's executive branch with 40 percent of his staff holding the CPA designation and 21 percent being CGFMs.
- Reforming the audit process, which was criticized for years for being ineffective and cumbersome. Now most audits are completed in a year or less as opposed to the former two- to three-year time frame.
- Installing PwC's TeamMate software, which automated work paper storage on disk, so auditors no longer had to carry tons of paper with them. Every auditor working for his division was using the software when he retired.
- Training his staff to be the best. With the hiring of 600 new auditors in the past five years, the audit services branch faced a training crisis. "So we have established a program to teach them to do government work, which helps on the retention side as well," Roslewicz said, adding that he fully supported giving staff time off to study for and take the CPA and CGFM Examinations.
- Being elected AGA's National President, which he views as recognition of one's accomplishments.

Tom underwent heart bypass surgery shortly before his retirement, but recovered well and went on to enjoy retirement activities of traveling, model railroading, and playing grandpa to his grandsons, who were 2 and 4 at the time of his retirement.

Tom was able to attend both our 2004 & 2009 Awards Banquets and told us that his current hobbies included Mountain Climbing! NOVAGA's Dare-to-Be-Bold was still a chapter member in 2018!

At the time of his presidency, Gene was Deputy Auditor General of the U.S. Army and had served on numerous AGA and AICPA committees, including Chairman of the Publications Policy Board of The Government Accountants Journal in 1984. He contributed at least one article to the Government Accountants Journal:

• Setting Standards, a chapter in "Forty Years of Progress in Government Financial Management," 1950-1990, co-authored with Pat Copeland.



Gene played a large role on the government auditing scene, culminating in his receiving the prestigious Einhorn-Gary Award, which recognizes Service to Community and AGA, at the National Professional Development Conference in 2004.

At that time, Mr. Reardon has been an active AGA Member for over 36 years. He first joined AGA on April 11, 1968, while working for the US Army Audit Agency in St. Louis. During the 1980's, when reassigned to St. Louis, he became president of the St. Louis chapter and continued his involvement with AGA while working for AAA in Texas and Europe. He was instrumental in working with the State Board of CPAs to recognize Federal Government auditing as qualifying experience for CPA certification in Missouri. In his last years in the Northern Virginia area, he not only served as NOVAGA Chapter President from 1991-1992, but followed and encouraged six other prominent AAA leaders to serve as Chapter President. He continuously encouraged AAA employees to become involved with AGA - for example, this year's NOVAGA Board includes five AAA employees and monthly Board meetings are held at AAA Headquarters in Alexandria. He carried this tradition to IG DoD.

At the National level, he has been part of a core group of members that could always be counted on to lend his

expertise and enhance the profession. He was a member of the National Executive Committee and served on many Program Development Conference (PDC), budget, and publication committees. He has also served on AGA's National Awards Committee for several years.

This was a culmination of numerous other awards throughout his career, including:

• In 1994, he was selected as the recipient for AGA's prestigious Elmer Staats Award, presented at AGA's annual National Leadership Conference, to formally recognize

federal professionals who exemplify and promote excellence in government, outstanding leadership, high ethical standards and innovative management procedures.

- In 1997, the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants recognized him as one of the top five Certified Public Accountants in Government.
- In 2000, in recognition of his excellence in advancing government accountability, Mr. Reardon was awarded the prestigious Meritorious Executive Award. Each year, the President confers the rank of Distinguished Executive and Meritorious Executive on a select group of career members of the Senior Executive Service (SES) who have provided exceptional

service to the American people over an extended period of time. These senior executives are outstanding leaders, who consistently demonstrate strength, integrity, industry, and a

relentless commitment to public service. Through their personal conduct and results-oriented leadership, they have earned and kept a high degree of public confidence and trust. They have demonstrated their success in balancing the needs and perspectives of customers, stakeholders, and employees with organizational results. Executives from across Government are nominated by their agency heads, evaluated by citizen panels, and, finally, designated by the President. The awards are prestigious and unique.

• In May 2001, his alma mater, Washburn University, bestowed upon him an Honorary Doctorate of Commerce Degree.

• In November 2003, Mr. Reardon was awarded the Army Superior Performance Award.

U.S. Army He has saved the Army billions of dollars and helped it transform into the 21st Century. After over 30 years with the U.S. Army Audit Agency, culminating as The Auditor General of the Army, he took over the role of Deputy Inspector General for Auditing for DOD in 2003.

In May 2005, NOVAGA presented Gene the **Jeffrey C. Steinhoff Award for Excellence in Federal Financial Management**, which formally recognizes federal professionals who exemplify and promote excellence in government, outstanding leadership, high ethical standards, and innovative management procedures. At the time of the award, he had almost 40 years of contributions to auditing in the federal government.

He was always on the forefront of interpreting and incorporating new standards for defense auditors. He radically changed the way auditors operate, transforming them from an adversarial role to a customer-oriented focus. He streamlined his business to make it more responsive. Through his almost 40-year involvement in AGA at all levels, he has broadened his impact to all federal agencies.

Thoughts on a Government Career

In the March 2006 Issue of NOVAGA News, President Pat Brannin interviewed Gene and contributed the following article:

On February 1, 2006, approximately 200 people gathered at the Army Navy Country Club in Arlington, Virginia, to bid farewell to retiring Acting Principal Deputy Inspector General, Department of Defense, Francis E. "Gene" Reardon. NOVAGA members in attendance included Tom Gimble, DoD Acting Inspector General; Joyce Morrow, then-Auditor General of the Army; Dick Leach, Auditor General of the Navy; Shel Young, DoD Deputy Inspector General for Intelligence; Mary Ugone, DoD Deputy Inspector General for Auditing; and Jeff Steinhoff of GAO. Mr. Reardon has been an AGA member since 1968. He has supported the NOVAGA and AGA for these many years, including being President of the NOVAGA. At the NOVAGA 2005 Awards Banquet, he was presented with the Jeffrey Steinhoff Award for Excellence in Federal Financial Management in recognition of his work to exemplify and promote excellence in government, outstanding leadership, high ethical standards, and innovative management procedures.

Upon his retirement, Mr. Reardon received the DoD IG Distinguished Civilian Service Award "for exemplary civilian service during his 38 years of federal service" and "for his exceptional leadership, tireless commitment to integrity, excellence, and selfless service which enhanced the mission of the department of defense." Mr. Reardon was also presented with a letter of appreciation from President George W. Bush, followed by a series of other presentations from the OIG Deputy Inspectors General and friends.


We asked if he would write an article to share those lessons he learned and how he succeeded in his career with the NOVAGA members who are starting their careers or who might consider midcareer corrections. His thoughts on how he managed his very successful career follow.

Gene: Your NOVAGA friends and colleagues wish you the best in your retirement!

Gene's Thoughts Upon Retirement.

Retirement from the Federal Government has finally arrived for me. I know the statement leaves open some doors – like does that mean I might seek other work – perhaps. I am not quite sure what I will be doing in a few months: it could be fishing, golfing, consulting, or auditing.

I give you that background for what follows -- my thoughts on my career and how some things I have done or not done have helped me retire as a member of the Senior Executive Service.

Throughout my career I always had a plan or vision of what I wanted to achieve or aspire to. I usually focused these aspirations in 3- to 5-year timeframes. I then adjusted those goals as I reached certain levels or timeframes. For example, as a GS-7 or GS-9, I was thinking about making the GS-11 or GS-12 level. As a GS-7 my goal to be a GS-12 was at the far end of my 3- to 5-year timeframe. Just like organizations have strategic plans, I believe individuals should have the same. This plan needs many of the same elements that an organization's plan would require – goals, strategies, feedback, periodic assessment, etc. When I discuss goals I am speaking of establishing target grades or positions that I wanted to achieve and a time period or range for that achievement. I observed and used others who had reached those target positions as models for me to build on. I examined what skills they had. Sure they possessed technical ability. But what else – in the way of education, certifications, broader experience -- and what they had done – in the way of job mobility, professional organizations, committee participation. I used all of this in an endeavor to make or adjust my plan and execution.

In addition, I always asked for feedback on my performance; how I could do better. And I did not ask just my boss, I also asked my boss's boss and my team. Many people do not want to do this, nor do people want to provide feedback. With a supervisor you may get that you are doing fine. However, I would advise you to press for more; choose an appropriate time to try to probe your boss a little more with "even if I am doing well, is there something I could do better. If so, what might it be?" Do the same with others who know your work.

Using this type of information I would put it all together as a general plan of things I needed to do. In addition to a plan, I sought and got a lot of mentoring – I did not often recognize it as mentoring then, but that is what it was and it came from lots of people. You need to listen when people are talking to you about your work or your performance. We often cast off a comment from a boss or even a peer as non-important, yet it might be very important – especially to your boss. These one phrase or one minute discussions may be feedback or mentoring; recognize it and use it.

During my career I moved a bit more than the average Federal employee, but not nearly as often as military personnel. These moves greatly helped my career as they gave me new experiences and exposed me to many more bosses and potential bosses. I have found that many more people than you think are watching you as you go through your professional career. You never know when one of these observers has an opening that you have applied for. I believe that the more people that your skills are exposed to the better. Relocating was something that I was pretty willing to do until my sons got into high school. As a result, I was much more open to opportunities from a variety of locations. This brings me to the place where I say you can have a plan but if you are not putting it in place and considering honestly the circumstances of your situation you might never have a chance for success. Say your plan is to be a GS-15 at your current duty station, but there are no GS-15 billets at that location. I do not hold out much hope for your plan. In addition, if you are one of six to eight people vying for one and only one position in a certain location, you had better have a great plan for success or a much longer timeline on which to measure success. In short, as I moved through my career, I tried to locate myself in situations where there were options for promotions and for added experience.

Along the way as you are striving to achieve your goals, I would recommend that you try to an extent to be as great an expert in your functional area as possible. In addition, I recommend that you also try to learn something about the business or organization you are in. No one is able to do their job without support, whether from IT, budget, personnel, etc. And as you move up the ladder of success, you become more and more involved in overall management issues such as personnel, budget, travel, etc. All the necessary but often forgotten things needed to run an organization. I believe that the more you know about these "back shop" duties the better manager and leader you will be when you reach that level. Therefore, I strongly recommend as you go through your 30- to 35- year career, you try to spend a little of your time in the administrative type positions that I have discussed. These types of assignments as well as other developmental opportunity not only afford you skills you will need later as a Senior Executive or other senior leader but keep you refreshed as you go through your career.

I mentioned developmental opportunities above. Again I would advise if possible during your career that you try to do one or two meaningful developmental assignments that are work related -- such as a special assistant or a stint in policy, oversight, follow-up, or personnel. In addition, and especially if you cannot obtain one of these assignments at work, consider opportunities for these developmental-like assignments in civic or professional organizations. As a member in such organizations, you can be an officer, a member of a committee or board -- all different challenges. In my career I was twice a chapter president for AGA, a member of the National Executive Committee, and served on numerous boards in a variety of positions. I also served on a committee for a state AICPA Society and two different national AICPA committees. Besides giving me experience in leadership, project management, negotiating, contracting, etc., I was able to meet interesting people, some of whom have been and continue to be very instrumental in my career. Those sorts of assignments do take added work and time, but I have found them to be great, non-job or non-performance appraisal threatening experiences, that build your repertoire of knowledge and skills. In saying all this it should be aparent that I believe in the value of professional associations such as the Association of Government Accountants, Institute of Internal Auditors, and American Society of Military Comptrollers.

As you progress in your career, you need to be realistic in your expectations and be honest with yourself about your future. For example, if others around you are getting leadership responsibilities and you are not, or if vacancies exist for the grade you would like to move to and they remain vacant, you may have some hard decisions to make about your career. In fact it may be time to change your career. Sometime recognizing this is one of the most important things you can do in your life.

The last thing I offer as advice about your career is that it is your career and you have to manage it. No one but you can nor should be responsible for your career. You, therefore, need a plan and you need to adjust it as your life and situation change. The biggest, most important thing to your career and plans is to be brutally honest with what is going on in your career and life and after those self assessments taking the actions necessary to achieve your goals.

Gene returned to Missouri with his wife, Melody. He has done some work with Management Consultants.

When we contacted Gene in March 2009 about his tenure with NOVAGA, he said that:

"...We had fund raising through education events and did something for the community...As you know my main job now is hitting coach and recruiter for the Central Methodist Lady Eagles softball team."

Vital Statistics

President Ronell B. Raaum, CGFM CGAP, GAO

Ronell is familiar to many of us, having been active in AGA for many years.

He authored numerous articles in The Federal Accountant, later The Government Accountants Journal, including:

- Future Directions in Government Accounting, December 1975, co-authored with Donald L. Scantlebury, former NOVAGA and National AGA President.
- A Recipe for Writing Management Audit Reports, Summer 1982.
- A Professional Sports Type Personnel System for Auditors, Summer 1984
- Summarizing Audit Results to Satisfy an Operational Auditor's Many Customers, Winter 1985-1986, co-authored with Ira Goldstein and Thomas F. O'Connor.

According to The Government Accountants Journal, Ronell began his professional career with the U.S. General Accounting Office (now Government Accountability Office) in 1962 and served in the Seattle regional office and the European branch of GAO's International Division. In 1975, Ronell was a supervisory auditor with the Financial and General Management Studies Division of GAO. By 1982, he was a Group Director in the Accounting and Financial Management Division of GAO. He has a BS in Accounting, and is the author and co-author of several articles, including a book on Operational Auditing. For NOVAGA, he was a member, a board member, and finally President, and continues to be involved with the chapter.

Ronell was kind enough to allow himself to be subjected to being interviewed in March 2009. Here are the results of that interview:

 First, tell us about yourself. What were you doing when you served as NOVAGA President? And what have you been up to since then?

When I served as NOVAGA President I was an Assistant Director at GAO doing what we called productivity audits.

 Can you share any pictures of you during your Presidency, of chapter activities and members, or updated pictures of you and prominent members?

I am sure pictures were taken, but that was sooooo many years ago. I do not have any. I am not a big picture keeping guy.

 What types of activities did the chapter do? Do you have a list of meetings that you held, with location, topics and speakers? What about half-day and all-day educational events and minimaxes (and who came up with that term and when was that?)

We were holding meetings at the Sheraton by the Pentagon when I was President. It was a good location. The hotel ran a shuttle from the Pentagon metro stop. I think most people drove. There was ample free parking.

I was one of the inventors of the mini-max training event. Minimum cost for maximum training. It was free if you came for the evening meeting. The idea was to increase attendance at the monthly meeting. The 2-hour mini-max became popular but it did not add much attendance to meetings. I once held the record for the highest attendance at a mini-max I presented – I think with around 65 people. I ran the mini-max events for a couple years.

We also had at least one full-day education event. Those were to make money to run the chapter. I ran those for a couple years.

I arranged to have an Astronaut speak at a monthly meeting.

• What types of community service events did the chapter do? We've noticed MS Walk participation for many years – did you all participate and do you know when that started?

I know we did community service events when I was President, but I don't remember what they were; nothing big. I think we had a couple members participate in public service tax service.

• What types of social or outreach programs did you do?

Well, those were the days when we did some drinking before the evening meeting and after the evening meeting. That was our social outreach. But that was mild compared with what we did 10 years before. I was young then.

 Did you have a focus on Early Careers – our youngest/newest members, and if so, what types of activities did you do to promote Early Career involvement?

I don't think we had a focus on Early Careers, other than new NOVAGA members got to attend a meeting for free. We had a Greeter program (before Wal-Mart) where the goal was to greet all the people who came to NOVAGA the first time. We would talk with them and line them up with someone they could talk and sit with during the meeting. After my Presidency I did that on an informal basis.

 What was going on in the Federal Government at the time you were NOVAGA President? What was the mood of the country? Did you use typewriters and punch cards and close out year-ends manually?

Wow! Gosh, it was so long ago I have forgotten what year I was president. I think we were using computers for word processing.

• How long were you involved with AGA (possibly also at the National level) and do you have any significant memories or events that stand out in your mind?

I was pretty active with AGA for 25 years. I worked at Hq for six months. I was on several National committees, including the committee that reviewed applications for the CGFM Certification.

One small accomplishment. I was asked to head the National Newsletter competition committee. The AGA communications guy made one request, "Ronell, please select the best Newsletters so that I do not have to spend my time explaining to Chapters why their Newsletter did not win." I developed a spread sheet with criteria that judges used. Believe it or not, it worked. AGA posted the winning Newsletters at the PDC and, I was told, that the complaints went away. It proves the merits of having a good system.



I wrote a play that was put on at a NOVAGA meeting. Two of my friends were the actors, along with two younger members.

• What accomplishment are you the most proud of during your tenure as NOVAGA President?

I am most proud of the fact that I had the largest Board up to that time. I think I had about 35 people on the Board. I had more people ask to be on the Board but I ran out of things for people to do. My belief was that if members were once on the Board they would remain an active member of NOVAGA for the remainder of their professional career. I think it worked to a degree. Also, if folks were on the Board they tended to come to meetings which increased our attendance. In those days our averaged attendance was about 70 attendees. In earlier days we used to average over 100.

o Do you have anything else that you'd like to add or would like our future leaders to know?

Making members welcome who come to a NOVAGA meeting for the first time is, I believe, critically important. It is a human thing to do and it helps make them feel like a real NOVAGA AGAer.

After his NOVAGA presidency, Ronell continued to be active AGA. He was on the Publications Committee of The Government Accountants Journal for many years, including 1986-1991

Ronell attended our May 2004 Banquet to catch us up on what he has been doing. Although retired from the Federal Government, Ronell is still actively imparting his wisdom on new generations of accountants. He works for the USDA Graduate School and lives in Springfield, Virginia. He has been a faithful NOVAGA member.



What's Happening in Government?

OMB Circular A-87 Out

The final revisions to OMB Circular A-87, Cost Principles Applicable to State and Local Governments, conforms many of the *A-87* requirements to those in OMB Circular A-21, Cost Principles for Educational Institutions. Among other things, the final revisions will allow interest on certain equipment and building acquisitions or improvements, clarify the allowability of depreciation and use charges, disallow self-assessed taxes that have a disproportionate impact of federal programs, and clarify lobbying and mass severance pay cost prohibitions.

The revision applies to cost-allocation plans and indirect cost proposals submitted or prepared for fiscal years that begins on or after September 1, 1995. For other costs, this revision should be applied to all awards or amendments made on or after September 1, 1995.

The chapter concluded program year 1995-1996 with healthy excess of receipts over expenditures. Total receipts for the period were over \$45,000. Expenditures totaled nearly \$32,000. Most of the receipts can be attributed to our successful education events. As expected, meal subsidies at meetings, costs to stage educational events, and, newsletter expenses topped the expenditures.

Membership

As of April 30, 1996, NOVAGA had 753 members—a 9 percent overall increase from the same date last year. On the up side, during the past year we gained 124 new members, 16 transfers in, and 40 reinstates. On the downside, we had 4 deceased/resigned, 105 suspends, and 12 transfers out.

Julie Bryant ran an innovative Member Points program this year to get members involved – with prizes ranging from PDC registration to full PDC costs covered!

In her last newsletter, Carol wrote:

As many of you know, this newsletter is the last one for the 1995-96 program year. As we wrap up the year, I'd like to extend special thanks to the Board members who worked' so diligently to continue NOVAGA's tradition of excellence. Although each worked hard to provide you with services such as thought-provocative speakers and timely training sessions, or to take care of our chapter's administration, there are a few who went above and beyond the call of duty. Please join me in thanking:

- **Russ Allen**, who variously negotiated with, badgered; begged maneuvered, and cajoled the hotel into providing the service we wanted on the dates we wanted at a price we could live with, in addition to coordinating our CGFM program.
- **Don Cress**, who managed to be everywhere at once, taking care of problems before they arose, as he orchestrated training events.
- **Tom Druzgal**, who should have been able to rest on his laurels as past president, and instead was tormented trying to set up a training session while the government kept shutting down.
- Jack Hufnagle, who not only selected fascinating dinner speakers, but was always there to introduce them and provide our token gift.
- Laura Koschny, who managed to get NOVAGA mentioned more than any other organization in Mike Causey's Washington Post column.
- Janice LeRoy, who devoted exorbitant energy to reaching out to our many members whose primary contact with NOVAGA is the interesting and, attractive newsletters she put together every month, and who exhibited incredible patience as we prepared our last-minute input for the second year in a row.
- **Nancy Sinclitico**, who gracefully juggled her role as Treasurer with the recently departed Peter White, and persisted in collecting thousands in receivables that we'd written off last year.
- Andrea Walker, who not only resumed her role taking reservations for attendance at our meetings, but also got a NOVAGA team organized for the MS Walk which earned over \$1000 in pledges.

Thank you all for a most enjoyable year. Together I think we made it a successful one.



Board Meetings

NOVAGA President Dale Williams got the year off to a bold start with a lively Board of Directors meeting at the Pension Benefit Guaranty Corporation in beautiful downtown Washington, July 9.

After a quick acceptance of the June 10 transition meeting minutes, Treasurer **Russ Allen**, CGFM, reported a bank balance of \$14.000. He also raised the issue of two Certificates of Deposit, for \$5,000 and \$10,000, respectively. The Board agreed to reinvest the CDs at maturity. The Board approved a tentative budget for FY 1999 of \$19,000, with a final budget to be approved September 15. It also agreed to audit the books for FY-end June 30.

Meanwhile, Chapter Recognition guru **John-Paul Beaudet**, announced that NOVAGA had already chalked up 1,440 points in the 1998-99 program year (see p. 7 for update.)

Programs Director **John Laney**, CGFM, announced the mailing of 972 survey forms to better serve members and increase meeting attendance. He noted that a \$200 savings bond is being raffled as an incentive for members to get surveys in. He noted a joint meeting with IMA in February, 1999, and hinted at an exciting line-up of speakers for the new season. The Board readily subsidized the dinner price by \$5 per member to encourage participation.

Satellite Meetings Advisory Board Member **Anne-Marie Chavez**, CGFM, announced an exciting new season of satellite training at the Fort Belvoir Community Club. Again, with an aim to activate members, the Board voted a subsidy of up to \$2.50 per lunch.

Meetings Director **Laura Koschny**, CGFM, presented a comprehensive cost survey of meeting sites to help hold down member costs. Attendance Director **Andrea Walker**, CGFM, presented a postcard campaign to bring out members, and the Board agreed to energize facilitators with a free meal at meetings.


AGA National celebrated its 50th Anniversary in 2000! Congratulations!

Eye Surgery. The chapter undertook an ambitious community service project to pay for eye surgery for Caroline M. Carol Codori spearheaded the effort.

Caroline was from Cameroon. Caroline's dad was a GAO International Auditor Fellow in 1984 when Carol was director of that program. Carol had been working privately for over 5 years on this and was finally able to arrange for it through Fresh Start Surgical Gifts (fssg.org), a foundation in Encinitas, California. They provide free plastic surgery to children.

Caroline had her first surgery on August 5, 2000. She recovered in California with her mom, Agnes, and a host family, the Turners, through September. She needed some more tests and one minor touch up surgery, and went home in October. The chapter had about \$7,000 in expenses in California--even with semi-free room, board, travel, and medical.

Carol wrote: Some fun and special non-medical moments among us: They had never seen a body of water, much less the Pacific Ocean. What a thrill! The little hot tub and swimming pool at the clinic's recommended hotel were totally fantastic to them. We jumped (cautiously) for joy while holding on to the edge. The escalator at the zoo was a "fun terror." I was always urging us to walk faster. I burned myself trying to cook with Agnes. Agnes is a great cook! Caroline learned to wear a baseball cap. I thought she looked like a model in her new glasses. We cried a bunch after her bandages came off. These are all shared with love and good humor among good friends.

Local media were on hand during the surgical weekend on August 5-6. One reporter interviewed me and wrote about Caroline's case. I will try to capture some of this excitement in an article being written with Captain David Grundies, former president of the San Diego

chapter of the American Society of Military Comptrollers (ASMC). His physician wife is a founding board member of FSSG, and they personally came to visit with Caroline as she recovered.

As you can see, July and August were truly life changing experiences. The saga continues until at least early October. That is when we have booked their return home. The foundation's director may be in DC after that, and I have given him an open invitation to speak at a chapter meeting.

The NOVAGA chapter was supportive and the expenses were in the Community Service plan. They sent a fund raising request to our NOVAGA members. Carol also invited National Capital Region chapters as well as AGA and ASMC chapters in San Diego to build a broader base. As Carol wrote in the chapter's 2000-2001 plan, NOVAGA plans to "think globally, act locally" about community service.

Lyle writes: 'In some ways the initiative caused some internal anguish among members, but in the final analysis we were all a part of Carol's vision to provide assistance to the young lady and her family. I think all of us supported the effort. I would imagine it was one of the most ambitious service projects the chapter has pursued.'



The Northern Virginia Chapter Mints "Presentation Coin"

And here is what the 'coin' is all about. Article compiled by Don Bloomer, DODIG, NOVAGA Atlarge Board member

The Presentation Coin will be given at the November and subsequent meetings to new members, members who reach their 25th, 30th or 50th anniversary with the AGA, and members who return to the monthly meetings after 3 years or more. The Board may from time to time choose to recognize other NOVAGA members with the coin for special acts.

Such presentation coins, although used today for many reasons, are rooted in military history and tradition. Following is the history of the military coin. We hope to challenge the new and returning members to be active participants in the NOVAGA chapter which strives to serve government accountability professionals and advance government accountability and to thank the long term members for their support in meeting our challenges over the years.

During World War I, American volunteers from all parts of the country filled the newly formed flying squadrons. Some were wealthy scions attending colleges such as Yale and Harvard who quit in mid-term to join the war. In one squadron, a wealthy lieutenant ordered medallions struck in solid bronze and presented them to his unit. One young pilot placed the medallion in a small leather pouch that he wore about his neck.

Shortly after acquiring the medallions, the pilot's aircraft was severely damaged by ground fire. He was forced to land behind enemy lines and was immediately captured by a German patrol. In order to discourage his escape, the Germans took all of his personal identification except for the small leather pouch around his neck. In the meantime, he was taken to a small French town near the front. Taking advantage of a bombardment that night, he escaped. However, he was without personal identification.

He succeeded in avoiding German patrols by donning civilian attire and reached the front lines. With great difficulty, he crossed no-man's land. Eventually, he stumbled onto a French outpost. Unfortunately, saboteurs had plagued the French in the sector. They sometimes masqueraded as civilians and wore civilian clothes. Not recognizing the young pilot's American accent, the French thought him to be a saboteur and made ready to execute him. He had no

identification to prove his allegiance, but he did have his leather pouch containing the medallion. He showed the medallion to his would-be executioners and one of his French captors recognized squadron insignia on the medallion. They delayed his execution long enough for him to confirm his identity. Instead of shooting him they gave him a bottle of wine.

Back at his squadron, it became tradition to ensure that all members carried their medallion or coin at all times. This was accomplished through challenge in the following manner - a challenger would ask to see the medallion. If the challenged could not produce a medallion, they were required to buy a drink of choice for the member who challenged them. If the challenged member produced a medallion, then the challenging member was required to pay for the drink. This tradition continued on throughout the war and for many years after the war while surviving members of the squadron were still alive.

Today, the military coin is still a "Challenge Coin" in the Special Forces, Rangers and especially the Airborne community's "Jumpmaster Coin" but is more commonly used as a coin for excellence in achievements that don't quite meet the requirements of an official military award. Coins are primarily given by Army commanders LTC (05) and above.

Outgoing EPA IG Tells of Search for Accountability

Nikki L. Tinsley, Inspector General of the Environmental Protection Agency since 1997, retired from the federal government on March 1 after almost 35 years of public service. An ambitious leader within the inspector general community, Tinsley shared her reflections on the past decade as a federal auditor in an interview with *Government Executive*. Tinsley, a member of **AGA's Northern Virginia Chapter** and co-chair of the AGA's First National Internal Control and Fraud Conference in September, said she sees her greatest legacy as one of culture change at the agency. "When I came to headquarters, our auditors thought they had done their job when they had identified a problem," she said. "When I got to EPA, I automatically thought that programs were supposed to do something," she said, noting that she has a penchant for program analysis that can be attributed in part to an early-career stint

at the Government Accountability Office, as well as to a personality type that won't just leave things alone. Tinsley said she was eager to take government auditing past the traditional inspector general's realm of fraud, waste and abuse, to look not just at how money is managed, but also at how well the spending of that money accomplishes agency objectives.



Congratulations to NOVAGA's own Jeffery Steinhoff! AICPA Names Three Recipients For 2006 Outstanding CPA in Government Award CPAs in Federal, State and Local Government Honored

Washington, D.C., August 21, 2006 – The American Institute of Certified Public Accountants (AICPA) announced the three 2006 recipients of the Outstanding CPA in Government Award today. The awards recognize CPAs working in the federal, state and local levels of government who have made significant contributions to increased efficiency and effectiveness of government organizations and to the growth and enhancement of the profession. The awards were presented by Leslie A. Murphy, AICPA Chair, at the AICPA's 23rd Annual National Governmental Accounting and Auditing Update Conference being held in Washington, D.C. This is the first year the AICPA has selected a winner at all three levels of government, in prior years, one award was granted each year on a rotating basis among the different levels of government.



Jeffery Steinhoff, the winner of the federal award, is Managing Director for Financial Management and Assurance, the largest audit team at the U.S. Government Accountability Office (GAO). Steinhoff has held top leadership positions in GAO's Senior

Executive Service for more than half of his 38 years of federal service, acting as a catalyst for sweeping improvements in government financial management and auditing. Steinhoff has been at the forefront of the enactment of almost every major financial management legislative initiative in the past 25 years, most notably the landmark Chief Financial Officers (CFO) Act of 1990. During the past five years alone, he has led initiatives that have resulted in over \$36 billion in financial benefits to American taxpayers.



Jeffrey C. Steinhoff Award Excellence in Federal Financial Management

DONALD V. HAMMOND Deputy Director, Division of Reserve Bank Operations and Payment Systems, Board of Governors, Federal Reserve System

Mr. Donald V. Hammond is awarded the Steinhoff Award for his many years of dedicated service to ensure accountability in all areas of the federal government. He affected us all

not only through his work with the Treasury Department and now with the Federal Reserve Board, but with his service on the CFO Council, the JFMIP, and on several Trust Fund Boards. In addition he always tirelessly supported AGA, promoting the profession and those of us serving in it.

Mr. Hammond recently assumed the role of Deputy Director, Division of Reserve Bank Operations and Payment Systems, Board of Governors, Federal Reserve System.

Prior to this position, he served as Treasury Fiscal Assistant Secretary, a career position to which he was appointed on September 27, 1998, after serving as the Deputy Fiscal Assistant Secretary since July 1996. In his position, he provided policy oversight over the activities of the Financial Management Service and the Bureau of the Public Debt in conducting the fiscal affairs of the federal government. The office also serves as the Treasury's liaison with the Federal Reserve System in its role as the government's fiscal agent. The scope of his responsibilities included management of the government's financial management, the execution of the government's financing activities and the operation of government-wide financial accounting and reporting systems including the preparation of the Consolidated Financial Statements of the United States.

In addition, Mr. Hammond was a statutory member of the Government-wide CFO Council, represented Treasury on the JFMIP Steering Committee and represented the Secretary on the Trust Fund Boards for the National Archives and Library of Congress.

Previously, he was the Assistant Director of the Treasury's Government Securities Regulations Staff, which has the responsibility for developing regulations for government securities broker-dealers in the areas of financial responsibility, custody, record keeping and reporting. Earlier in his Treasury career, he served as the Secretary of the Chrysler Corporation Loan Guarantee Board.

Mr. Hammond received a Masters Degree in Finance and Accounting from Northwestern University's J. L. Kellogg Graduate School of Management and was admitted to the accounting honorary Beta Alpha Psi. He is a graduate of Duke University with a B.A. in Chemistry and Economics.

Throughout his career, he has been extremely active with the Association of Government Accountants, most recently as a Co-chair of the 2007 AGA National Leadership Conference Technical Committee. He is a member of the Northern Virginia Chapter.



He gave us a brief overview of the International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) and the Public and Private Implications for Public Accounting Firms.

IFRS are the new Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP). IFRS has already been adopted by the European Union and Australia. The World Bank uses IFRS. Overall, more than 130 countries are already using IFRS or going to it soon.

Why would the US adopt IFRS? Primarily for consistency in financial statement presentation around the world. Why would a firm adopt it early? If a firm has many subsidiaries overseas and also conducts business in the US, it would be to its advantage to adopt IFRS.

There are many hurdles and challenges to overcome when making the switch to IFRS. Some principles under GAAP can't be used under IFRS, such as Last-in-First-Out (LIFO) inventory practice.

KPMG already has an IFRS Institute that hosts training. Look for it on their Web site at www.kpmgifrsinstitute.com.

SEC IFRS Roadmap

Liza McAndrew Moberg, a Professional Accounting Fellow in the Office of the Chief Accountant's International Affairs group at the U.S. Securites and Exchange Commission in Washington DC, was our next presenter. Her responsibilities include matters related to the use of IFRS in the U.S. capital markets.

Mrs. McAndrew Moberg presented proposed milestones to implement IFRS in the US. The current chairman of the SEC, Christopher Cox, is very pro-IFRS. She pointed out that Canada has adopted IFRS as the Canadian GAAP. SEC is promoting getting IFRS taught in schools. A final decision is anticipated by 2011, and if IFRS is adopted, by 2014 the large, accelerated filers would have to report 3 years' worth of financial statements under IFRS.

Implications of International Auditing Standards

GAO's Jeanette Franzel and Gail Vallieres then discussed the auditing aspect of International Standards. Ms. Franzel is Director, Financial Management and Assurance (FMA), at the US Government Accountability Office (GAO). Gail Vallieres is an assistant director at FMA. Both have quite extensive experience in working with US and international standard-setting bodies to ensure that the entire international community is talking the same language. Besides authoring the US Government Auditing Standards (commonly referred to as the Yellow Book), they work with the AICPA, IAASB, the PCAOB, the IIA and INTOSAI (extra credit for you if you know what all these letters stand for!).

Jeanette and Gail stressed that GAO believes strongly in convergence. They stated that the Accounting Standards Board (ASB) is working to converge all auditing standards by 2010, at which time they will pull the international standards into the current auditing standards. (Note that adoption of international accounting standards, as we heard earlier, is still in question.)

They also encouraged those of us involved in government accounting & auditing to go to the ASB subsection of the AICPA Web site and comment on the Exposure Drafts to new standards to ensure that they consider the government side as well as the publiclytraded companies' side of the issues.

Comprehensive Long-Term Fiscal Projections

We ended the afternoon with a thoughtprovoking discussion by Eileen Parlow, an Assistant Director at Federal Accounting Standards Advisory Board (FASAB). She is well-versed in financial statement presentation and discussed FASAB's attempt to communicate the state of fiscal readiness and sustainability to the general public? She stated that the Treasury Department prepares the future projections and GAO audits them.



Discussion

FASAB also has an Exposure Draft out proposing new government financial statements that show Receipts and Spending not only in Present Value Dollars, but in percent of Gross Domestic Product (GDP). The bottom line would be 'Spending in Excess of Receipts.' Each category would be broken down by Medicare, Social Security, and All Other. One interesting fact that the Treasury report on Social Insurance lists is that the effects of cost growth in Medicare and Medicaid are much more critical than the effect of the aging Baby Boomers. Deadline for comments is January 5th, and hearings will be held in February.

Wrap Up

Thanks to Ron Adolphi and Mary Braun, who put together the December half-day training. Look for the presentations on our Web site <u>www.novaga.org</u>.

Ms. Parlow covered many of the points made in former Comptroller General David Walker's recent movie, IOUSA, which serves to dramatically emphasize how much debt the US currently has – and how we cannot sustain the economy at this rate.





The Road to Improved Accounting

Two great Treasury Department speakers started off the day. **Carolann Marker, Director Customer Relationship Management Division**, and **Gregory Keel, Accountant, Customer Relationship Management Division**. They gave us the 'Big Picture' of all Governmentwide Accounting (formerly known as GWA) which has been replaced by the new Central Accounting and Reporting System (CARS). The change was brought about to speed up end-of-month accounting and reportability – previously it took them five weeks to tell the President how much the government spent for Hurricane Katrina – now they can do it almost instantly. In the past, most agencies simply spent money, then went back later to actually account for it. With CARS, the Treasury Account Symbols (TAS) have been expanded to a larger, more standardized TAS, which has added a leading zero to the old 2-digit TAS. And agencies now have to input a TAS before Treasury will disburse funds.

FASAB Standards Update

Wendy Payne, Executive Director, FASAB, then updated us on recentlycompleted projects - Earmarked Funds are now Funds from Dedicated Collections, and Deferred Maintenance and Repairs have been redefined. FASAB is also currently studying the Federal Reporting Model and examining challenges such as whether we really need a balance sheet – citizens really like the transparency and drill-down reporting on sites such as Recovery.gov – but managers and CFOs want dashboards and increased data availability. FASAB currently has a task force studying the issue and is reviewing the CFO Act 20 years later. What does the way ahead hold? Perhaps Performance Reporting, such as a Statement of Net Cost Improvements; or integrated financial and non-financial performance reporting. Perhaps increasing Understandability of statements.

As one of the key players on the Yellow Book team, she updated us on the December 2011 Yellow Book revision, which is effective for all Performance Audits started after 15 December 2011. One of the major updates has been to Independence, including the need to document your independence assessment, including any safeguards you applied. Note that GAO is currently working on interpretations – be sure to check their Web site frequently (www.gao.gov/yellowbook).

In addition, the COSO framework on Internal Controls has recently been updated (see <u>www.ic.coso.org</u> – Exposure Draft comments were due 31 March 2012), and GAO has begun updating the Green

Our lunchtime speaker was **Miguel 'Joey' Aviles**, who reminded us that WE are in charge of our own destiny – we can make a difference – and attitude is everything. Joey provided a light-hearted look at how we can overcome our challenges by 'Pushing the Cow.'

Leading with Less

The theme for the afternoon session was "Leading with Less – When Leadership Becomes Visible." We heard from some of the top leaders in the Federal government community on the challenges faced with fading budgets and constrained resources.

GPO has partnered with Google to sell products electronically and pioneered a digital online system. They were one of the first agencies to offer buyouts and early retirements which helped reduce the workforce from 2,200 to 1,900, and rented out 100,000 square feet of unused space.

Ms. Vance-Cooks was accompanied by a team from GPO, including their **CFO**, **Steve Shed**. The Federal Times came and wrote a great article in the next day's online issue.

CFO's Perspective Beyond 2012

Owen Barwell, CFO, Department of Energy, reminded us that the CFO is the Bedrock of an organization. In today's world, he is no longer just a 'bean counter.' His counsel is sought and he is looked to as a professional - one who is independent and objective. Some of the his future challenges include the upcoming retirement wave - first talked about several years ago, slightly slowed down due to the recent economic conditions, but still sure to happen. A lot of organizational knowledge will be leaving. The CFO will also be taking on a newer/broader role on advising the company on future performance – today they collect about 190 performance measures at Energy. One of the challenges with these performance measures is that the managers report on measures they feel comfortable sharing with the CFO and OMB - not necessarily those that they need to run their business effectively. Another challenge is that the focus today is on the budget of everything - and they should be focusing on analyzing the costs and determining the Return on Investment.

DeCA and the fine line between Government Entity and Private Enterprise given today's operating environment

Our final speaker closed the day in a fun, entertaining way. Lauren P. (Larry) Bands, Chief Financial Executive, Defense Commissary Agency (DeCA) used props to show us in real terms what it means to serve the customer.



DeCA sells groceries to military personnel around the world at cost. They have a small Operations and Maintenance (O&M) appropriation to support their overhead and use a five percent surcharge on grocery purchases to finance commissary repair and maintenance. With annual sales of almost \$6 billion, 17,000 employees, and almost 250 stores, they claim a 32 percent savings over traditional grocery stores for their military customers. Over 60 percent of their workforce is military-related, with over 25 percent being military spouses. Their best sellers are cereal, juice, diapers - and peanut butter! In 1991, DeCA consolidated the individual services' commissaries to achieve economies of scale. DeCA balances its services – more than 50 percent of its stores are in small, remote and isolated locations, but these only account for 20 percent of its sales. Only 16 percent of its stores are large stores, which also account for 20 percent of its sales. With recent O&M reductions, there has been pressure to reduce their budget. However, with annual sales of over \$50 million to WIC and Food Stamp customers, they pledge to maintain their customer service perspective. Larry truly 'walks the talk' of his business besides speaking to us, he is a past president of the Richmondarea American Society of Military Comptrollers (ASMC) chapter

(where DeCA is headquartered), and we appreciate his willingness to travel 'up north' to speak to us!

At the end of the day, we could truly say the experiences and insights shared by these leaders has given us ideas and made us think how we can and need to do things differently. This was a "must be there" event – thanks again to **Carl Patton** for being the primary powerhouse behind the day's very cost effective 7 CPEs!

Accountability

Pam Lindsey became our Accountability Chari and spearheaded NOVAGA's first **Citizen Centric Report** (see a copy on our Web site, <u>www.novaga.org</u>).

Seeing a need to provide more informative government reporting to the general public, AGA launched the Citizen Centric Report initiative. This report is a nicely designed template of 4 pages of information the average citizen would want to know. The first page covers general information such as population figures, regional characteristics and government goals. The second page covers performance of key missions and services. The third page addresses revenues and costs, and the fourth page examines future concerns and initiatives for the ensuing year. AGA envisioned the reports to be prepared annually, although each entity would set their

own parameters and goals-perhaps issuing them more or less frequently.

This initiative is moving across governmental entities fast and for good reason. The CCR reports are fantastic examples of transparency to the constituency in a format that captures the essential message citizens want to know. The CCR is the "CliffNotes" of governance—within minutes the constituency will know the essential facts, figures, and future issues and initiatives of their governing entity. For the governing entity, CCR is a talking paper and report card, and for the citizens, CCR is engagement. If they know the facts, figures, and initiatives they will be better informed and can judge where their concerns might be.

On Thursday, December 1, 2011, the Capital Region AGA chapters sponsored an **Accountability Outreach CEAR Trivia Event** at Clyde's of Gallery Place to publicize AGA's Accountability effort.

The Northern Virginia Chapter had three members (**Mie Miller, Donell Ries, and Pamela Lindsey**) that conducted a review of federal agencies Performance and Accountability reports (**PARs**) or the Agency Financial Report (**AFR**) as part of the Certificate of Excellence in Accountability Reporting (**CEAR**) Review Program. The CEAR program provides recommendations to agencies to improve the quality and usefulness of PAR/AFR and to publicly recognize agencies that are award recipients of the CEAR. The CEAR program is another tool for promoting accountability and transparency of agencies in the federal government.

Also New this Year – We created an opportunity for Early Careers to work with Accountability Committee to visit local Colleges, Universities, and High Schools to promote a Citizen Centric Reporting scholarship program. NOVAGA awarded two \$1,000 scholarships to young individuals seeking careers in the accounting/finance/auditing field. Each candidate was required to prepare a Citizen Centric Report (CCR) on behalf of an entity (town, city, state agency, nonprofit etc.) and submit to NOVAGA for judging.

Congratulations to GMU's **Michael Ly** and **Tomohiro Nibe**, who both received \$1,000 scholarships for their submission of Citizen Centric Reports (CCRs) for George Mason University and the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority, respectively. 



About AGA

The Association of Government Accountants (AGA) was founded in 1950. AGA's mission is to foster learning, certification, leadership and collaboration for professionals and stakeholders committed to advancing governmental accountability. AGA has approximately 100 chapters, with approximately 15,000 members as of its membership year ended April 30, 2015. AGA's membership is made up of federal employees (27%); state and local employees (43%); private sector employees (18%); and academia, students and retirees (12%) constituting the remainder. The AGA has an 87% retention rate of its membership. The AGA sponsors the Certified Government Financial Manager (CGFM) certification which recognizes the unique skills and special knowledge required of today's government financial managers.

Who is NOVAGA?

The Northern Virginia Chapter of AGA (NOVAGA) was chartered on June 1, 1968 and now includes approximately 930 professional members in the government financial mangement community. A 50th Anniversary Recap -- We've Come a Long Way, Baby! by Brian J. Grega

In the middle of the 1960's, the Metropolitan Washington Area experienced explosive growth in the surrounding suburban areas. As a result of this growth, visionaries saw the need for a Virginia "local" Association of Government Accountants (AGA) chapter. In June 1968, Charter Number 66 was granted and the Northern Virginia Chapter was born! [See Annex C] Joseph Welsch became the first chapter president. The chapter began with approximately 70 members.

Some historical facts about the chapter and the profession:

- In 1979, the chapter grew to 628 members!
- In 1983, the chapter grew to 720 members!
- In 1984, microcomputers begin to appear in the workplace. What?!?
- On November 15, 1990, the Chief Financial Officers Act of 1990 becomes law.
- 1994 was the beginning of the CGFM program!
- In late 1997, the chapter was growing strong at close to 900 members!
- During the 1998-1999 program year, the chapter introduced "Satellite Meetings" to reach other geographical areas of the Northern Virginia Chapter.
- During program year 1999-2000, the chapter began transitioning from paper newsletters to the chapter website for the dissemination of information.
- The events of September 11, 2001 took the lives of three chapter members. Members charged forward to raise funds for the families of these members.
- During program year 2002-2003, the chapter by-laws were rewritten to conform to National standards.
- In 2003, the chapter's membership was steady at approximately 700 members.
- In 2003, the chapter started accepting credit card payments for educational events.
- During program year 2005-2006, the chapter achieved platinum status for the first time in several years.

As the chapter turns 50 years old this year, the chapter has maintained a strong membership base. As of March 15, 2018 the chapter had **1,043 active members**! Please remember to renew your AGA membership by March 31, 2018!

I would also like to thank all of the past and current members that currently serve or previously served on the chapter board or as chapter president for the past 50 years. The chapter would not be the success it is today without your time and dedication to the AGA and the Northern VA Chapter. C. in general terms so as to cover similar situations that any arise cheschere in the future. In addition to the tochnical changes to the by-laws, necessary in the Committee's opinion to cover multiple chopters in metropolitan crees, the Consister has incorporated in its proposed revision certs in substantive changes which it believes are essential to protect the Association from the possible suverse effects of having more than one chapter in an area. These substantive changes are: 1. Permit persons living or working in a setropolitan eres to belong to any chapter in the area even though

- 2 they may neither live nor work in the geographical areas of the particular chapters. 2. Require the establishment of an area council wherever there is more than one chapter in a retropolitan erea and give authority to the related Regional Vice President of the Association to make final decisions when the council cannot spree on matters affecting the interest of cny chapter in the erea. Substantive change number one is to prevent the possible decimation of the Washington Chapter if membership were to be limited only to those living or working within the city limits of the District of Columbia. The provisions will permit members to remain in or join those chapters where the meetings are most convenient to attend or where for other personal reasons of the members they prefer to belong. It will also introduce a certain amount of healthy competition between chapters in a metropolitan area for services to their members. The second substantive change in the Committee's opinion is particulorly needed in the Washington area but could be important anywhere. To be successful, many activities of FGAA in a metropolitan area must be carried on in a coordinated monner for the entire area. These activities relate to dealings with Federal Agencies, professional orgenizations, and educational institutions, and the conduct of large-scale symposiums, semimors, and workshops. The Committee believes that the establishment of area councils consisting of officials of the several chapters in a metropolitan area will most this need. In the event that an area council cannot reach agreement on any matter a chapter may request a ruling from the oppropriate Regional Vice Precident whose decision will be final. The Committee also recommends that dealings with Federal Agencies on matters of National interest be hendled by the Mational Association. In the second phone of the Committee's assignment, as to whether the proposed change is in the best interest of FGAA, the Counittee considered the numerous advantages and disadvantages to the Association that have been publicly advanced by the proponents and opponents of the proposed change. The Committee is of the opinion that the advanteges for outweigh the disadvantages particularly if the safeguards previously recommended by the Committee in this letter are adopted. The Counittee was impressed by, and gave considerable weight to, one particular argument educated by save proponents of more chapters for the Washington erea. This study was attached to the Federal Government Accountants Association January 19, 1968 Minutes, which included the following discussion:

<u>Chapter formation</u> was the next item on the agenda. Mr. Robinson presented the report of the special committee (Robinson, Barr, Robert D. Benson, Lindsley H. Noble and Frank Weitzel) which analyzed the problems arising from petitions of two groups to form chapters in the Washington suburbs. A copy of the report is enclosed with these minutes and forms a part thereof. Essential provisions: Permit chapter formation and allow persons living and/or working in Washington area to select whatever chapter they wish to join; create an area council for coordination, regional vice president to have final authority if points of difference arise. Mr. Powell moved, with second by Mr. Higginbotham, that the report be submitted to the Bylaws Committee for processing. To implement the recommendations, the national and chapter bylaws will require amending. The motion was carried unanimously. President Penick expressed his personal appreciation, and that of the Board, to Mr. Robinson and his committee for their excellent work, constituting a valuable and significant service to the Association. Another hurdle to overcome was to amend National's By Laws allowing more than one chapter in a major metropolitan area.

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT ACCOUNTANTS ASSOCIATION CHAPTER MESSAGE 45-68 May 13, 1968 Members of Association Executive Committee To: Petitions for Charters from two proposed new chapters in Re: metropolitan area of Washington, D.C. Chapter Message 33-68, dated March 6, 1968, requested voting by all chapters on the acceptance of two proposed amendments to the National Bylaws which would recognize and hence permit the formation of chapters in city areas where a chapter already exists. You will recall that these amendments were drafted as FGAA charters for new chapters in the northern Virginia and Maryland suburbs of Washington, D.C. A number of Association Executive Committee members asked that action on issuing charters to the petitioning groups be held in abeyance until the Bylaws had been clarified and various objections met. The prescribed 60 days for chapter voting on the amendments having elapsed, this is to advise that as of the present date, May 13, 1968, the National Office has received unit vote returns from 38 chapters with the following results: 87 unit votes for, 2 opposed. The National Office was also advised informally that balloting among members of the Washington Chapter was: 410 individual members in favor, 143 opposed. The total of votes cast represents 12 unit votes. The chapter's executive committee is meeting this week to decide how these unit votes will be recorded. The Washington vote will be added to the record at that time. However, since the total potential unit votes of all chapters is 145 and Art. XIV, Sect. 5 of the Bylaws provides that a majority of votes received from the chapters is sufficient for approval of an amendment, the present total of 87 unit votes for the two amendments under discussion is more than needed for adoption. The two subject amendments therefore stand approved. It is now in order for the Association Executive Committee to act on approving the issuance of charters to the proposed new FGAA of Northern Virginia and the proposed FGAA of Montgomery-Prince Georges Counties. Ballots for your action on this matter are enclosed. These ballots are distributed herewith to Executive Committee members with the understanding that the prior objections and difficulties with respect to the proposed chapters have been amicably resolved, and that the provisions now set forth in the National Bylaws concerning such situations represent a constructive, forward step for FGAA. The two new groups have already completed their organization on a temporary basis and look forward to receiving their charters this year, prior to the Denver Symposium. To facilitate their plans, you are requested to give priority attention to the enclosed ballots and return them to the National Office by June 1, 1968. President Penick and the National Office again wish to express appreciation to all Executive Committee members for your patience and understanding in bringing this subject to an harmonious conclusion. Since a two-thirds majority of the full membership of the Association Executive Committee is required for approval of any matter submitted to the Executive Committee, it is important that each member participate in the voting.

And that was it! When the Executive Committee met on 18 June 1968, Northern Virginia was duly represented by John Busardo, and we were born!

NOVAGA CHAPTER BYLAWS

ASSOCIATION OF GOVERNMENT ACCOUNTANTS OF NORTHERN VIRGINIA CHAPTER

DATE OF LAST AMENDMENT: MARCH 2003

BYLAWS

ARTICLE I NAME

The name of this organization is the Association of Government Accountants – Northern Virginia Chapter (hereinafter referred to as "the Chapter"). This Chapter is a part of the Association of Government Accountants (hereinafter referred to as "the Association" or "AGA").

ARTICLE II ASSOCIATION PURPOSE AND OBJECTIVES

SECTION 1. PURPOSE

AGA serves professionals in the government financial management community by providing quality education, fostering professional development and certification, and supporting standards and research to advance government accountability.

The purpose of the Association and Chapter is to be a professional organization dedicated to the advancement of government financial management. The Association shall serve its members by providing or sponsoring appropriate educational programs, encouraging professional development, influencing governmental financial management policies and practices and serving as an advocate for the profession. The Association shall serve government officials and the public by sponsoring efforts to ensure full and fair accountability for all public monies and by providing a variety of pro bono services throughout the United States and its territories that support that end.

SECTION 2. OBJECTIVES

The Association and Chapter shall have the following objectives:

(a) Primarily to instruct, train and inform government financial managers in the fields of accounting, auditing, budgeting, systems, and financial management. This continuing education process will provide for the professional development of government financial managers so that they may better serve the public.

(b) To encourage and provide educational events for the interchange of ideas among financial managers in government service and among government and non-government financial managers.

(c) To contribute to the advancement of financial management principles and standards and, through educational events, promote appropriate utilization of financial management methods and techniques to improve management control and accountability to the public.

(d) To bring together professional financial managers in the government and the community for educational and other constructive endeavors.

(e) To promote the observance of professional standards and ethics in the accomplishment of government financial management activities.

(f) To recognize the unique skills and knowledge required of professional who specialize in government financial management by sponsoring a professional certification program and working with employers to promote and recognize the certification in hiring, job specifications, performance evaluations and promotional exam announcements.

SECTION 3. LEGISLATIVE CLAUSE

The Chapter President or designee may inform government officials of the Chapter's position or viewpoint on matters pending before them that are of concern to the Chapter. However, Chapter members are prohibited from:

(a) Representing the Chapter in any lobbying effort and

(b) Intervening in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office.

ARTICLE III CODE OF ETHICS

SECTION 1. PURPOSE

In order to foster the highest professional standards and behavior, and exemplary service to all levels of government, the AGA Code of Ethics has been developed as guidance for the members of the Association, certified government financial managers (CGFMs), and for the information of their employers. AGA members and/or CGFMs are expected to abide by the Association's Code of Ethics and the Chapter has adopted the AGA Code of Ethics.

ARTICLE IV MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. MEMBERS

As established in the Bylaws of the Association, the members of the Chapter shall consist of Full Members, Early Career Members, Special Early Career Members, Retired Members, Lifetime Members, Honorary Members and Corporate Members.

SECTION 2. FULL MEMBERS

This class of membership requires six or more years of government experience acceptable to the Membership Committee, involving the professional performance of financial management activities in an administrative, supervisory and/or operational capacity. This class is also available to individuals with similar experience outside the government who are engaged in educational or private sector activities having the same objectives as the AGA, or who have made a contribution toward the improvement of financial management in government.

SECTION 3. EARLY CAREER MEMBERS

This class of membership is available to individuals whose experience does not meet the quantitative (i.e., six or more years) and/or qualitative requirements for full membership.

SECTION 4. SPECIAL EARLY CAREER MEMBERS

This class of membership is available to individuals in their first year of employment and/or college/university students. This class of membership is not available to individuals who have been employed in the financial management field for one (1) year or more.

SECTION 5. RETIRED MEMBERS

This class of membership is available to individuals who have retired from and are no longer substantially working in the government financial management community.

SECTION 6. LIFETIME MEMBERS

This class of membership is to be designated at the discretion of the National Executive Committee to recognize a member's distinguished service to the Association over a sustained period of time.

SECTION 7. HONORARY MEMBERS

This class of membership is to be designated at the discretion of the National Executive Committee to recognize distinguished service to the Association and/or exemplary contributions to governmental financial management. Only highly- noteworthy, nationally recognized individuals who cannot meet the requirements for a full or retired member will be considered.

SECTION 8. CORPORATE MEMBERS

This class of membership is available to commercial activities/ventures (e.g., company, corporation, partnership, and sole-proprietor) that are actively engaged in and support AGA's purpose and objectives.

SECTION 9. DUTIES OF MEMBERS

It is the duty and responsibility of members to:

- (a) Endorse the purpose and objectives of the Chapter and the AGA;
- (b) Uphold and be guided in their professional conduct by the AGA's Code of Ethics; and

(c) Cooperate with AGA's Professional Ethics Board in any investigation of alleged violation of the Code of Ethics.

(d) Actively participate in the Chapter to the extent possible.

SECTION 10. RESIGNATION OF MEMBERS

Members may resign at any time, except that no member shall be permitted to resign while under investigation for an alleged violation of the AGA's Code of Ethics.

SECTION 11. REMOVAL OF MEMBERS

(a) Disciplining of members is performed by the AGA under the terms of these Bylaws and as provided in the AGA's Policies and Procedures.

(b) A member who has been appropriately invoiced and who fails to pay his or her membership dues for a period of two months after the due date shall be suspended automatically as a member of the AGA. Suspended members who continue to fail to pay their membership dues shall be removed automatically from the rolls of the AGA four months after the suspension date.

(c) Membership in the AGA may be suspended by the National Executive Committee as provided in the AGA's Policies and Procedures.

SECTION 12. REINSTATEMENT

The Association's National Executive Committee may prescribe the conditions, policies and procedures under which members may be reinstated.

ARTICLE V MEETING OF MEMBERS

Because of the large Chapter membership (typically several hundred), efficient operation of the Chapter necessitates an expanded role of an Executive Board. Accordingly, members of the Executive Board are an essential component of the Chapter's business. Members will be notified of Executive Board meetings and are encouraged to attend as observers, or when called for comments. These meetings may be called on such dated and at such times and places as may be designated by the President.

SECTION 1. CALLS TO MEETING

General membership meetings to advance the objectives of the Chapter may be called on such dates and at such times and places as may be designated by the Chapter President.

SECTION 2. NOTICE OF MEETINGS

Notice of each meeting of the Chapter must be provided to each member of the Chapter at least 7 days prior to the meeting.

SECTION 3. QUORUM

Twenty percent of the members, or 10 members, whichever is less, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of official business presented at any Chapter meeting of the membership.

SECTION 4. VOTING RIGHTS

All members shall have the right to vote on Chapter matters and those AGA matters put to a vote of the entire membership.

SECTION 5. VOTING ACTIONS

Matters requiring a Chapter vote shall be approved by a plurality (i.e., most votes) of those voting, except for Bylaws changes (See Article XIII).

ARTICLE VI CHAPTER GOVERNANCE

SECTION 1. OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS

The Chapter officers shall be the President, Past President, President-Elect, Secretary, and Treasurer. In addition, there will be Directors which serve as Committee Chairpersons, and in other roles designated by the President in consultation with the Executive Board.

a. The President shall be the prior year's President-Elect and shall serve for a one-year term in addition to any period in which he/she fills a vacancy in the office of the President.

b. The President-Elect, Secretary, Treasurer, and Directors shall be elected annually for one-year terms as provided in Article VIII.

SECTION 2. Chapter Executive Board

a. The Executive Board shall be the governing board of the Chapter and shall be comprised of the above described officers and directors.

b. Meetings of the Executive Board shall be held periodically at the call of the President, or by any five members of the Executive Board. A quorum is 10 persons. The President shall preside at all meetings. In the absence of the President, the officer to preside shall be determined in the following succession: President-Elect, Immediate Past President, Secretary, and Treasurer.

c. Unless precluded by other sections of the Bylaws and without limitations regarding other matters, the Executive Board shall have among its responsibilities the following:

d. Promulgate the policies and programs of the Chapter.

--Adopt an Annual Budget and approve revisions thereof in excess of ten percent of the line item's budgeted expenditures;

--Establish a Chapter dues schedule for all classes of members

--Review all actions and programs of the Chapters' Committees, Sub-Committees and Task Forces.

SECTION 3. ADVISORY BOARD, COMMITTEES, SUB-COMMITTEES, AND TASK FORCES

a. An Advisory Board, appointed by the President, provides periodic advice to the Officers and the Executive Board, but does not have voting rights at Executive Board meetings. A primary function is to assist in the process of nomination for annual awards and elections of Chapter officers.

b. The President, in consultation with the Chapter Executive Board, may establish Committees, Sub-Committees and Task Forces to assist in carrying out the program and operations of the Chapter.

SECTION 4. TERMS OF OFFICE

a. Members of committees and the Advisory Board shall be appointed for one-year terms.

b. Members of Sub-Committees and Task Forces shall be appointed for the duration of the designated purpose.

SECTION 5. REMOVAL OF CHAPTER OFFICERS AND/OR DIRECTORS

The responsibilities of Chapter Officers and/or Directors are set forth in the Chapter's Policies and Procedures Manual. Chapter Officers and/or Directors are expected to perform those duties. The Chapter Executive Board may remove any Chapter Officer and/or Director by a majority vote, if the applicable Chapter Officer and/or Director are not meeting the stated responsibilities.

SECTION 6. DUTIES OF COMMITTEES, SUB-COMMITTEES, AND TASK FORCES

The duties assigned to the Committees, Sub-Committees and Task Forces will be the prerogative of the President, in consultation with the Executive Board.

ARTICLE VII NOMINATIONS, ELECTIONS ANDFILLING OF VACANCIES FOR OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS

SECTION 1. NOMINATION

a. The Advisory Board shall nominate at least one candidate for the office of President-Elect-Select.

b. The sitting President-Elect shall nominate candidates for Officers and Directors. All nominees must indicate the willingness to serve if elected or selected.

c. Chapter members will be notified at least 2 weeks before elections of the names of the Advisory Board nominee and the proposed slate of Officers and Directors before elections held by the Executive Board.

d. Chapter members have the right to object, or provide comments on the Advisory Board's nominee and the proposed slate of Officers and Directors before elections held by the Executive Board.

e. Five percent of the Chapter members or 25 members, whichever is less, may submit an independent nomination for Chapter Officer or Director positions. Such nominations, which will be included on the ballot submitted to the Executive Board, must reflect the willingness of the individual to serve and shall be filed by May 1.

f. To be eligible for office in the Chapter, a member must be in good standing. The President or President-Elect may not succeed himself/herself, unless such person is filling the un-expired term of another duly elected officer.

SECTION 2. ELECTIONS

Chapter members will be advised in advance of planned elections and again have a right to provide their views/comments to the Executive Board before the elections. The Executive Board votes on the President –Elect, Officers and Directors. Winning requires a majority of the voting members of the Executive Board. Election results will be publicized to the Chapter on a timely basis.

SECTION 3. FILLING VACANCIES

In the event of a vacancy occurring in the Office of the President, the President-Elect will succeed. In the event of a vacancy in the Office of the President-Elect, the Advisory Board will be responsible for finding and nominating a candidate. In the case of a vacancy in any other Officer of Director position, the President of Executive Board shall appoint a member to fill the vacancy.

ARTICLE VIII FINANCIAL ADMINISTATION

SECTION 1. AUTHORITY

a. The Executive Board shall have authority to prescribe such procedures as it deems appropriate to assure adequate budgetary and financial controls for the Chapter. A balance of \$10,000 shall be carried over form one administration to the next.

b. Approval of the budget by the Executive Board shall constitute authority for responsible officials of the Chapter to obligate funds as provided in the budget. However, no commitment shall be made that will cause the pertinent category of expense in the budget to be exceeded by more than ten percent unless it has advance approval of the Executive Board.

SECTION 2. DUES

a. The Chapter portion of the annual dues rates for the different classes and categories of membership shall be set by a quorum vote of the Executive Board. Student members shall have no Chapter dues.

b. A member who has been appropriately invoiced and who fails to pay his/her membership dues for a period of two months after the due date shall be suspended automatically as a member of the Association and the Chapter. Suspended members who continue to fail to pay their membership dues shall be removed automatically from the rolls of the Association, four months after the suspension date.

c. The Membership Committee may recommend reinstatement of a member whose membership has been forfeited for non-payment of dues.

SECTION 3. WAIVER OF DUES – MILITARY DUES

Any civilian member who is required to serve an initial tour of duty with the United States Armed Forces or who, as a reservist, is called upon to perform extended active duty shall be granted a leave of absence from the Chapter while performing such military duty. Upon request, the member's dues shall be suspended for each fiscal year in which the tour occurs without any loss of rights and privileges to which the member was entitled prior to entering the military services.

SECTION 4. FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year of the Chapter shall end at the close of business on the 30th day of June each year.

ARTICLE IX COMMITTEES, SUBCOMMITTEES AND TASK FORCES

SECTION 1. FORMATION There shall be at least three standing committees, Executive, Nominating, and Bylaws and Procedures. In addition, the Chapter President, after ratification by the Executive Board, may establish Committees, Sub-Committees and Task Forces to assist in carrying out Chapter programs and operations.

SECTION 2. MEMBERSHIP

(a) The number of members comprising the Committees shall be determined by the amount of responsibility and work assigned.

(b) The Chapter President shall, in consultation with the Chapter President-Elect, appoint the Committee and Task Force Chairs. The chair may serve more than one year. The Chapter Executive Board shall ratify chair assignments.

(c) The Chapter President shall appoint the members of each Committee or Task Force in consultation with the Chapter President-Elect and the Committee and Task Force Chair, ensuring that the Committees and Task Forces, taken as a whole, are representative of the Chapter membership.

(d) All members of a Committee or Task Force shall be Chapter members in good standing.

(e) The Nominating Committee shall consist of the President-Elect (as Committee Chair), a Past-Chapter President (when available) and one or more member(s) nominated by the President-Elect and approved by the Executive Board.

(f) The Chair of the Bylaws and Procedures Committee shall be designated by the Chapter President.

SECTION 3. TERMS OF OFFICE

Committee members shall be appointed for one year. Members of the Sub-Committees and Task Forces shall be appointed for the duration of the Sub-Committee or Task Force.

SECTION 4. RESPONSIBILITIES

The duties assigned to the Committees, Sub-Committees and Task Forces shall be defined by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE X MEMBERSHIP AND PROGRAM YEARS

SECTION 1. MEMBERSHIP AND RECOGNITION YEAR

The membership and recognition year of the Association shall end at the close of business on the 30th day of April of each year.

SECTION 2. PROGRAM YEAR

The program year of the Association shall end at the close of business on June 30th of each year.

ARTICLE XI DISSOLUTION

In the event of liquidation, dissolution or winding up of the business and affairs of the Chapter, whether voluntary or involuntary or by operation of law, the Chapter Executive Committee shall, after paying or making provisions for payment of all liabilities of the Chapter, dispose of all assets exclusively for the purpose of the Chapter or to such Association or organization as shall at the time qualify as exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or corresponding provisions of any future Internal Revenue Law), in such manner as the Chapter Executive Committee shall determine. Any assets not so distributed shall be disposed of by the United States District Court for the third judicial district exclusively for such purposes or to such corporations or organizations as said court shall determine are organized and operated solely for public purpose.

ARTICLE XII PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

To transact official business at Chapter meetings, the rules of parliamentary procedure contained in the most recent revision of Robert's "Rules of Order" shall govern.

ARTICLE XIII AMENDMENTS TO BYLAWS

SECTION 1. ORIGINATION OF AMENDMENTS

Proposed changes in these Bylaws shall be submitted in the following manners:

a. By proposal in writing to the President-Elect, or President if the President-Elect position is vacant, from any committee;

b. By proposal in writing to the President-Elect signed by five percent of the membership or 25 members, whichever is less;

c. Members will be advised of proposed changes in an appropriate manner, as deemed by the Executive Board, normally in advance of final approval and will be allowed to comment if they wish.

SECTION 2. PROCESSING PROCEDURES

After review and coordination with the initiator, appropriate changes along with Committee analysis shall be submitted by the President-Elect to the Executive Board for vote. An affirmative vote by a quorum (twenty percent or 10 members, whichever is less) is required for approval.

Members will be advised in an appropriate manner and on a timely basis of approved Bylaws changes.

ARTICLE XIV LIABILITY OF OFFICERS AND INDEMNIFICATION

SECTION 1. LIMITATION ON LIABILITY Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary, the real and personal property of the Chapter officers shall not be available to satisfy any of the Chapter's corporate debts to any extent whatever. Chapter officers shall include those elected and appointed officers of the Chapter, members of the Chapter Executive Board and those elected and appointed members of the Chapter's duly constituted Committees and Task Forces.

SECTION 2. INDEMNIFICATION

(a) The Chapter may indemnify any current or former director, current or former officer, or any person who may have served at the Chapter's request as a director or officer of another Corporation, against expenses actually and necessarily incurred by him or her in connection with the defense of any action, suit, or proceeding in which he or she is made a party by reason of being or having been such director or officer, except in relation to matters as to which he or she shall be adjudged in such action, suit, or proceeding to be liable for negligence or misconduct in the performance of a duty.

(b) Expenses, including attorney's fees, incurred in defending a civil or criminal action, suit or proceeding may be paid by the Chapter in advance of the final disposition of the action, suit or proceeding as authorized by the Chapter Executive Committee in the specific case, upon receipt of an undertaking by or on behalf of the chapter officer or director of the Chapter to repay such amount unless it shall ultimately be determined that he or she is entitled to be indemnified by the Chapter as authorized herein.

(c) The indemnification provided hereunder shall not be deemed exclusive of any other rights to which those seeking indemnification may be entitled under any applicable statute as amended from time to time, any bylaw, agreement, vote of the members of the Chapter or disinterested directors or otherwise, both as to action in their official capacity and as to action in another capacity while holding such office. Such indemnification shall continue as to a person who has ceased to be a chapter officer or director of the Chapter and shall inure to the benefit of the heirs, executors and administrators of such person.

(d) The Chapter may purchase and maintain insurance on behalf of any person who is or was an officer or official of the Chapter, against any liability asserted against him/her and incurred by his/her status as such, whether or not the Chapter would have the power to indemnify him/her against such liability under the provision herein.
