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Who We Are

The GEC is an autonomous and independent commission of the Government of Guam. The Commission is made up of seven members, all of whom are registered voters of Guam. With recommendations made from the Democrat and Republican parties, *I Maga'låhen Guåhan* (Governor of Guam) appoints six members, three from each political party. The seventh member, an independent, is selected and appointed by the six members. Members serve a two-year term. Executive Director Maria I.D. Pangelinan serves at the pleasure of the Commission and manages the Guam Election Commission's administrative team.

Mission

The mission of the Guam Election Commission is to conduct efficient and effective elections in accordance with local and federal laws.

Goals and Objectives

The Guam Election Commission strives to provide the Guam electorate a fair, honest, and orderly election process.

History

The Guam Election Commission was created with the passage of P.L. 11-202 on December 12, 1972 and was comprised of members appointed by the Governor from each of the recognized political parties, with the chief commissioner serving as chairman. On March 1973, the Commission held their first meeting and appointed an Executive Director and an assistant in September of that year. In October 1973, the Commission moved into its office in the GCIC building in Hagåtña where it continues to operate.

Who qualifies to register?

An individual must meet the following qualifications as provided in 3 GCA §3101 to be a registered voter on Guam:

- ✓ Must be a citizen of the United States
- ✓ Must be a resident of Guam
- Must be 18 years of age on or before the day of election
- Must not be committed under a sentence of imprisonment
- ✓ Must not be confined to a mental institution
- ✓ Must not be judicially declared insane

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

- ➤ Public Auditor (1 seat)
- ➤ Guam Education Board (6 seats)
- Consolidated Commission on Utilities (2 seats)

- ➤ Candidate Packets for the 2020 Elections will be **tentatively** available on Jan. 2020.

Looking Forward

In anticipation of future elections, the GEC continues to:

- Preparing for the upcoming 2020 General Election, ensuring that elections are conducted in a fair, efficient, and effective manner
- Populate its voter registry
- Attend a National Certification in Election Administrations for seven employees
- Upgrade equipment in line with industry standards to ensure the security of Guam elections.
- Review and propose updates the Election Code of Guam as prescribed by P.L. 31-61
- Ensure a fair and transparent elections within Guam's dynamic social and political environment.

Challenges

The GEC confronts issues and barriers with:

- Conduct absentee voting in Saipan for Guam voters who were deployed to assist in recovery efforts after Super Typhoo Yutu.
- Increasing the number of registered voters and voter participation.
- Updating the Election Code, and modernizing our processes.
- Updating and upgrading the voter registry.
- Addressing administrative complaints and problems.
- Hiring 335 precinct officials; 22 poll maintenance workers; 14 telephone operators; and 29 tabulators
- Secure access with the Department of Motor Vehicles for motor voter registration and online voter registration.
